FARMERS HAD BIG TIME

Grangers' Picnic at Independence Was Attended by Thousands of People.

The Grangers' picnic in Independence last Friday and Saturday drew large crowds of farmers and hopmen from all parts of Polk county, and the two days' festivities were greatly enjoyed by the visitors. Governor Chamberlain was the principal speaker on Friday, and Dr. Woods Hutchison, of Portland, and J. W. Bailey, State Food and Dairy Commissioner, took an active part in the program Saturday. The Farmers' Convention was in charge of Dr. James Withycombe, assisted by Professors Pernot, Knisely and Corley, of the State Agricultural College. The attendance was large and the addresses were well received. Athletic sports, street entertainments and side-shows added to the pleasure of the occasion. John T. Ford, the jovial sheriff of Polk county, was the winner of the prize offered for the homeliest man in attendance.

Sewers Are Finished.

The Mill and Court street sewers were finished last Saturday, and the work is now ready for acceptance by the city. Contractor W. T. Jacobsen is expected to arrive from Portland in a few days, when an inspection of the sewers will be made. A force of men, under the supervision of City Engineer W. L. Soehren, are building a rock foundation for the mouth of the outlet sewer, and as soon as this part of the work is finished, the system will be ready for use. The city council will meet next Tuesday night to assess the cost of the improvement to the property benefited, and a date will be set for hearing objections of property-owners to the assessment. It is altogether probable that an ordinance to compel all owners of property in the business portion of town to connect with the sewers will be passed at once.

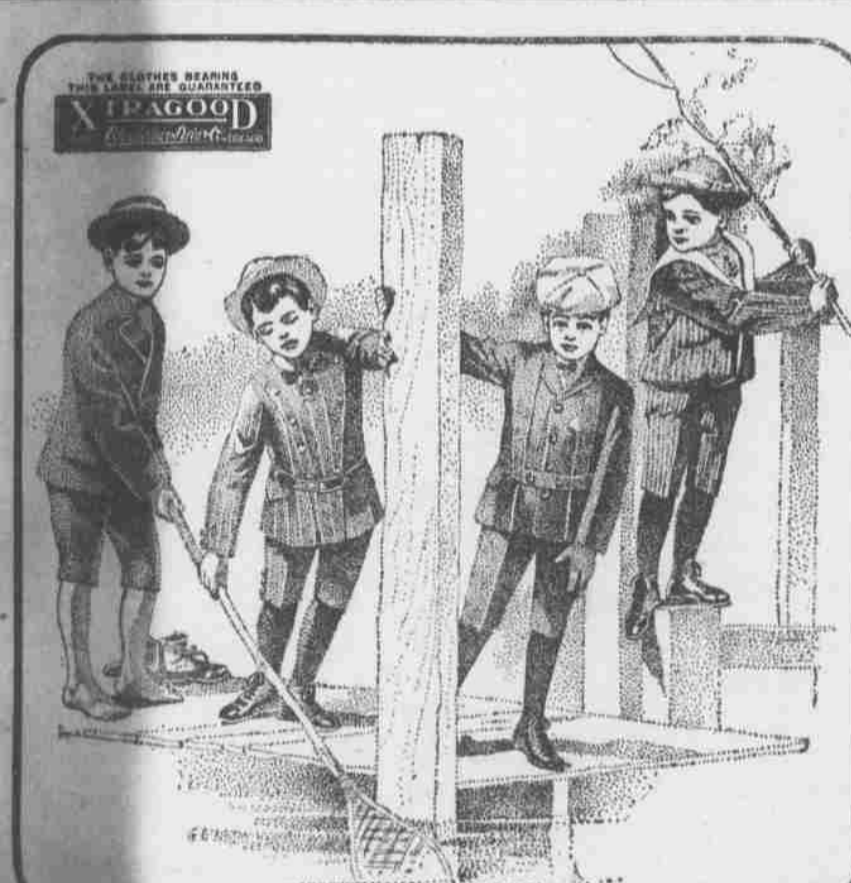
