GOOD AD FOR DALLAS

Lewis and Clark Division's New Envelope Furnishes Valuable Information.

The OBSERVER office has just completed the printing of five thousand "1905" envelopes for the Ladies' Lewis and Clark Division of Dallas, and the envelopes are now being delivered to the business men and other customers in this city.

The front side of the envelope bears the official design of the Lewis and Clark Fair, beautifully lithographed in colors, and the merchant's card and return request. On the back of the envelope is information in condensed form relative to Dallas, printed in red. The wording is as follows:

"When you come to the 1905 Fair, be sure to visit Dallas, Oregon, a thriving manufacturing town in the heart of the world-famed Willamette Valley.

"Dallas has two thousand inhabitants—delightful climate—mountain water—electric lights—sewerage—two railroads—motor line—two sawmills—foundry—machine shops—sash and door factory—tannery—flouring mill—wagon factories—organ factory—hardwood handle factory—ice factory—cold storage plant—good hotels—excellent public schools—handsome churches—well equipped college.

"The principal exports are lumber—hops—prunes—mohair—wool—grain—wood—hay—leather—flour.

"County seat of Polk county; sixty miles from Portland; fourteen miles from Salem, the State Capitol."

The envelope is a valuable and attractive advertisement of Dallas and the 1905 Fair, and will furnish much desirable information to people living in the Eastern States. It is expected that a large number of these envelopes will be printed and sent out within the next twelve months in addition to those already furnished by the local Division.

GRAIN HARVEST HAS BEGUN

Yield in Polk County Will Probably Exceed All Expectations.

Threshing of Fall wheat began in Polk county this week, and in a few days harvesting will be on in full blast in all parts of the Willamette Valley. Fall grain is turning out much better than was expected, and the farmers are correspondingly happy. The Government weather report says:

"The past week has been favorable for maturing and harvesting the grain crop. A few small showers occurred Wednesday and Thursday in the Willamette valley and coast counties. They greatly helped all growing vegetation, but caused a slight delay in harvest work. The stand of spring wheat and oats was thin, and the grain headed short, but the heads are well filled with plump berries, and the yields are nearly everywhere reported to be better than expected. Fall wheat and barley harvest is advancing rapidly and threshing from the shock has begun."

Fred Toner, the obliging deputy postmaster in the Dallas office, left Saturday for his annual hunting trip in the Cascade mountains, near Clear Lake. His companions on the trip will be Dr. G. S. Wright, of McMinnville, and John F. Clark and Harvey Farmer, of Oregon City. Mr. Toner's place in the postoffice will be filled by Ralph Hill.

WILL SELL CHOICE LANDS

Local Land Office Receiving Bids for Grande Ronde Reservation Tracts.

Twenty-six thousand acres of choice timber and agricultural lands in the Grande Ronde Indian Reservation are being sold by the Government. Bids for these lands are being received at the Oregon City Land Office. The office will continue to receive the bids, which come from every state in the Union, until 11 o'clock, Monday morning, August 8. At one o'clock in the afternoon of that day the bids will be opened by the officers of the local office, and, after being properly indorsed, will be forwarded to the Commissioner of the General Land Office, who will announce the successful bidders.

These lands represent that part of the original reservation that remains after the Indians have received their respective allotments. The Indians have ceded back to the Government these lands, which are now being auctioned to the highest bidder. The conditions of the sale provide that no bid at a less rate than \$1.25 per acre will be considered, while the entire tract of 26,000 acres must bring at least \$28,500 or no sale will be had.

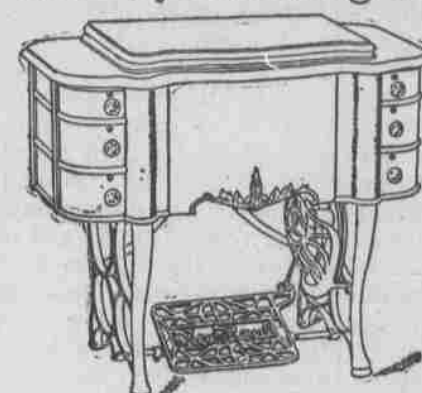

The Yamhill Reporter and the McMinnville News have been consolidated under the name of the News-Reporter. This is a strong combination, and Publishers Asbury and Estes will give the people of Yamhill county a live local newspaper.

Two-Thirds Crop in Yamhill.

The hop situation in Yamhill county is not by any means unpromising, and at least two-thirds of a good crop is expected, while some yards promise a yield equal to that of last year. There is a slight increase in the acreage over that of last year. In the vicinity of Lafayette there are 150 to 200 acres

of old yards, while about 60 acres have been set out this year, which should produce 600 or 800 bales; some yards of course will go higher than others, some claiming a yield of 1500 pounds per acre, while others will go as low as 600 pounds, owing to poor cultivation and missing hills.—McMinnville Reporter.
