HOPS REACH 30 CENTS

THREE HUNDRED BALES SOLD AT THIS PRICE YESTERDAY.

E. C. Kirkpatrick, of Dallas, Pays Highest Price of the Season for Polk County Crop.

The prediction that 1904 hops would reach the 30-cent mark was fulfilled yesterday when E. C. Kirkpatrick, the well-known Dallas buyer, paid that price for the D. B. Taylor crop of 300 bales at Independence. Mr. Kirkpatrick was the first buyer to pay 28 cents, a figure at which many Polk county hops have since been sold.

Nearly all of the hops grown around Dallas this year have been sold, and it is said that there are only three crops remaining in the hands of the growers in this district at the present time. The prices paid have ranged from 26 to 28 cents, the average being about 27½ cents. The farmers evidently considered it good policy to avoid speculation and sell on the first market, especially when the price offered was sufficient to reimburse them for the expense of raising and harvesting the crop and leave them a handsome profit, as was the case this year. The small amount of hops in the farmers' hands at the present time, however, is best accounted for by the fact that nearly all the yards around Dallas were bought by the dealers before the picking season began.

E. C. Kirkpatrick reports the recent purchase of 865 bales at prices ranging from 27 cents upward. These purchases are as follows: John Orr, 20 bales, at 27½ cents; A. R. Bell, 149 bales at 27 cents; Warren Frink, 90 bales at 27 cents; I. F. Yoakum, 102 bales, at 28 cents; Gilbert & Patterson, 300 bales, at 28 cents; Catlin & Linn, (Yost yard), 108 bales, at 27½ cents; Walter Bird, 40 bales, at 27 cents; G. F. McBee, 6 bales, at 27½ cents; T. A. Lively, 50 bales, at 27 cents.

R. E. Williams purchased 100 bales from D. Nachtigall, at 28 cents; 105 bales from Fred Koser, at 28 cents; 60 bales from Dunlop & Garbutt, at 27 cents; 200 bales from Sam Orr, at 28 cents; 125 bales from Joe Brown at 27½ cents; 130 bales from Sloper & Patton, at 28 cents; 50 bales from Huntley Brothers, at 28 cents. He also purchased 130 bales in Yamhill county; price not stated.

T. A. Riggs has purchased several crops, but as he is out of town, the names of the growers could not be learned.
