Dr. T. B. Ford, retiring presiding
elder of the Eugene district, is assigned
to the pastorate of the church at
Sunnyside, Portland; Rev. D. T.
Summerville goes to Albany, and
Rev. M. C. Wire is made presiding
elder of the Eugene district.

Polk county is no longer in the Eu-
gene district, but is now a part of the
West Portland district. In re-distric-
tling the conference, the Salem and
Grant's Pass districts were abolished.
All of the territory south of Eugene is
now in the Eugene district. The
Willamette river from Eugene to the
Columbia river is the dividing line
between the East Portland and West
Portland districts.

New Train for Corvallis.

A new morning and evening train
between Corvallis and Albany giving
facilities for a Corvallis and return
in a single day, went into effect on the
Corvallis and Eastern Tuesday. The
new train leaves Corvallis at 6 o'clock
a. m., connecting at Albany with the
7 o'clock local which arrives in Port-
land at 10 a. m. The arrival at Cor-
vallis in the evening is about 7:45,
making close connections at Albany
with the evening Southern Pacific train
which leaves Portland at 4 o'clock.

Sue For Specific Performance.

Lillenthal Bros., of New York, hav-
ing an office in Salem, have com-
menced a suit against Mike Keppinger,
Sarah Thornsberry and Albert Thorns-
berry, all of Gervais, to enforce
specific performance of a hop contract.
By the terms of the contract, the de-
fendant, Keppinger, agrees to sell and
deliver to Lillenthal Bros. 20,000
pounds of hops at 10 cents a pound.
The Thornsberys are parties because
they own the land and have some
interest in the hops grown by Keppin-
ger.

taken up. The case against Marie
Ware, Horace L. McKinley, S. A. D.
Puter, Emma L. Watson and other
defendants will not be held until the
other cases are disposed of.

Gravel to be used in ballasting the
track on the Yamhill division of the
Southern Pacific railroad is being
hauled out from the bar at Inde-
pendence at the rate of twenty-five
carloads a day. The gravel train
makes one trip in the forenoon and
one in the afternoon. A large amount
of gravel is also being brought to
Dallas for the Dallas-Falls City rail-
road. The heavy lumber traffic over
these two roads during the winter
months makes better tracks a
necessity.
