New Telephone Company.

A mutual telephone company was organized in Independence last Wednesday night with a capital of \$1000, subscribed by enterprising citizens. Riley Craven was elected president; W. W. Percival, vice-president; G. A. Hurley, secretary, and for the board of directors, J. R. Craven, W. W. Percival, Dr. O. D. Butler, Walter Lyon and August Sperling were chosen. The object of the company is to connect with the rural telephone lines already established in Polk county, and to encourage the establishment of other telephone lines and rural communication.

Will Drink at Club.

The Corvallis correspondent of the Evening Telegram says: "In view of the fact that January 1, Corvallis will be a 'dry' town for two years, there is talk of organizing a Commercial Club. A club has been talked of for several years, but so far the difficulty has been to secure a suitable location. The closing of the saloons will mean several vacant buildings, one or two of which could, with little expense, be turned into fine clubrooms. Meldrum Found Guilty.

Henry Meldrum, former United States Surveyor, was found guilty of forgery on twenty-one counts by a jury in the United States District Court, last Wednesday. This is the first conviction in the so-called land fraud cases, now pending before Judge Bellinger. Meldrum was accused of having forged the names of eighteen persons to applications for surveys of land in Harney county, Oregon, west and southwest of Harney Lake. 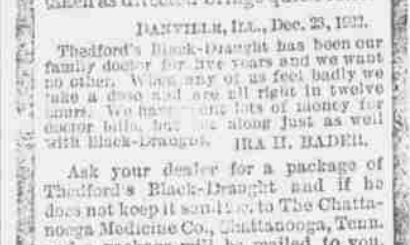
