**RETIRE FROM SAWMILL**

Coast Range Lumbering Company, of Falls City, Assigns Property to George Gerlinger.

The Coast Range Lumbering Company, of Falls City, has conveyed all its property to George T. Gerlinger, as trustee, for the benefit of its creditors. This company has been operating the sawmill commonly known as the "Watkins mill" at Falls City. The liabilities of the company, as scheduled, are about \$10,000.

By the terms of the deed of assignment, Mr. Gerlinger is to either operate or sell the mill, and convert property into money as rapidly as possible. This money is to be used in paying the company's debts. The trustee is required to mail to each creditor, at least once in every 60 days, a statement showing the business done and the result of the operation of the plant and property.
