It is expected that Head Consul Foley will be a candidate to succeed himself at the meeting of the Head Camp to be held in Los Angeles in April.

Mr. and Mrs. Field Allen and daughters, Mrs. Clarence Shultz and Mrs. Orville Shultz, attended the funeral of the late Charles Allen in Salem yesterday. Deceased was a native of Yamhill county and was 49 years of age. For the past three years he had been a resident of Salem. Besides a wife he leaves two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Cochran, of Moscow, Idaho; Mrs. Ellen Smith, Field and Albert Allen, of Polk county. His death was sudden, and was caused by heart disease.

Governor Chamberlain has appointed L. T. Harris, a republican, to fill the new Circuit Judgeship in the new Second Judicial district, and Sam White, democrat, to fill the new Judgeship in the Eighth district. "I believe in nonpartisanship in the judiciary department," said Governor Chamberlain, "and I have appointed one democrat and one republican. The first team and Willamette University will meet in Dallas tomorrow night. This will be the last appearance of the first team on the home floor this season, and a large attendance is expected.

John Smith Is Dead.

John Smith, an aged resident of the Grand Ronde reservation, died Tuesday, February 14 of senile decay. He was a member of the Rogue River tribe and was brought to the reservation in the winter of 1856. The royal blood flowed in his veins, and under the old tribal rule he would have been a chief. Even in his captivity, he was recognized as a chief by the Indians on the reservation, and was buried with all the honors due to one of his high rank. Smith had a wide acquaintance among the pioneer settlers of Polk county, and was respected for his quiet and honorable deportment. He leaves an aged wife and one daughter.

Judge Coad contracted a severe cold in Portland two weeks ago, and shortly after his arrival home, the ailment developed into a well-defined case of pneumonia. He was reported to be resting quietly at a late hour last night.

The evangelistic services conducted by Rev. J. E. Snyder at the Presbyterian church closed Sunday. The men's meeting in the courthouse Sunday afternoon was largely attended, fully 300 men and boys being present. The closing service at night in the Evangelical church was the largest meeting of the series, the house being packed to the doors. Much interest was manifested in the meetings, and many people decided to lead a purer and better life. The meetings are being continued by local pastors.

F. H. Cook died at his home in Monmouth, Saturday. Mr. Cook was born in Kentucky in 1832. Coming to Oregon in 1881 he engaged in the mercantile business at McCoy with Charles Graves. In 1892 he sold his interest in the business at McCoy and moved to Monmouth, where he has since resided. The funeral services were held Sunday at the Baptist church, of which church deceased was a member. Rev. Osborne of Independence preached the sermon. Interment was held in the cemetery west of Monmouth.—Independence West Side.

Parents Came From England.

In addition to the sketch of the life of the late Mrs. Boulah Riggs, published last week, the following facts will be of interest to many of our readers who were friends of this honored pioneer mother: Mrs. Riggs was a daughter of Thomas Drinkwater and Sarah Web, who came from England to the United States in 1810 and were married in Indiana in 1814. Mrs. Riggs is survived by one brother, Rev. Jacob Drinkwater, of Virginia, Illinois, 16 months her junior, and one sister, Mrs. Alex Wilday, also a resident of Illinois, 84 years her junior. The funeral was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Edward Gittens, at the farm,

and was largely attended. The pallbearers were J. L. Purvine, G. W. Myer, M. A. Burch, I. A. Allen, T. W. Brunk and William Peares, all members of old-time pioneer families of Polk county.
