WILL SUBMIT TO VOTE
Council Will Ask Authority to Pur-
chase Rock Crusher at Coming
City Election.

"Shall the City Council of the City
of Dallas borrow a sum of money not
to exceed \$1500 and issue city warrants
therefor, for the purpose of purchasing
and operating a rock crusher to be
owned by the city and used by it in
the repair and improvement of its
streets?"

This is a question that will be sub-
mitted to the voters of Dallas at the
annual city election to be held on
Monday, April 3. The resolution
authorizing the submission of the
question to a vote of the people passed
the council by a unanimous vote Mon-
day evening, all the members of the
board being present.

The sum of money named in the
resolution represents the price of a
crusher suitable to the needs of a
town of the size of Dallas, if it is
found necessary to purchase a new
machine, but it is highly probable
that a second-hand crusher in good
repair can be had for less than half
this amount. The council has secured
a 30-day option on a crusher in Port-
land, and this machine will be pur-
chased if the vote of the people is
favorable; provided, of course, that it
is found to be in good repair and
suitable to the city's needs. This
crusher was built by one of the lead-
ing machinery houses of the East, and
is one of the largest and best crushers
made. It is 9x16 in size, and has a
daily capacity of 250 tons. It can be
bought for \$400. One of the members
of the council examined the machine
a few days ago and reports that it ap-
pears to be in excellent condition and
practically as good as new.

If the vote of the people is favorable
at the coming April election, the
council will cause this machine to be
thoroughly inspected by competent
machinists who are familiar with
crushers, and if their report is favor-
able, the purchase will in all
probability be made. It is believed
that this crusher can be installed
ready for work, with all necessary
elevators and rock bins, for \$250,
making the total cost \$650, or less
than half the price of a new machine.

If, however, the result of the exami-
nation of this crusher should not
prove satisfactory, it may become
necessary to purchase a new crusher
to carry out the proposed street im-
provements, and for this reason the
council has decided to ask the people
whether or not they are willing to buy
a new crusher if no good second-hand
crusher can be had.

Under the provisions of the city
charter, it is not necessary to submit
this matter to a vote, as the council
has power and authority to purchase
any machinery needed for street im-
provement purposes; but the members
of the board do not desire to incur
this expense without the sanction of
the people. With the backing of a
vote of the citizens favorable to the
improvement, it is reasonably certain
that the present council, or any board
elected, will lose no time in carrying
out the work and giving Dallas good,
permanent streets.

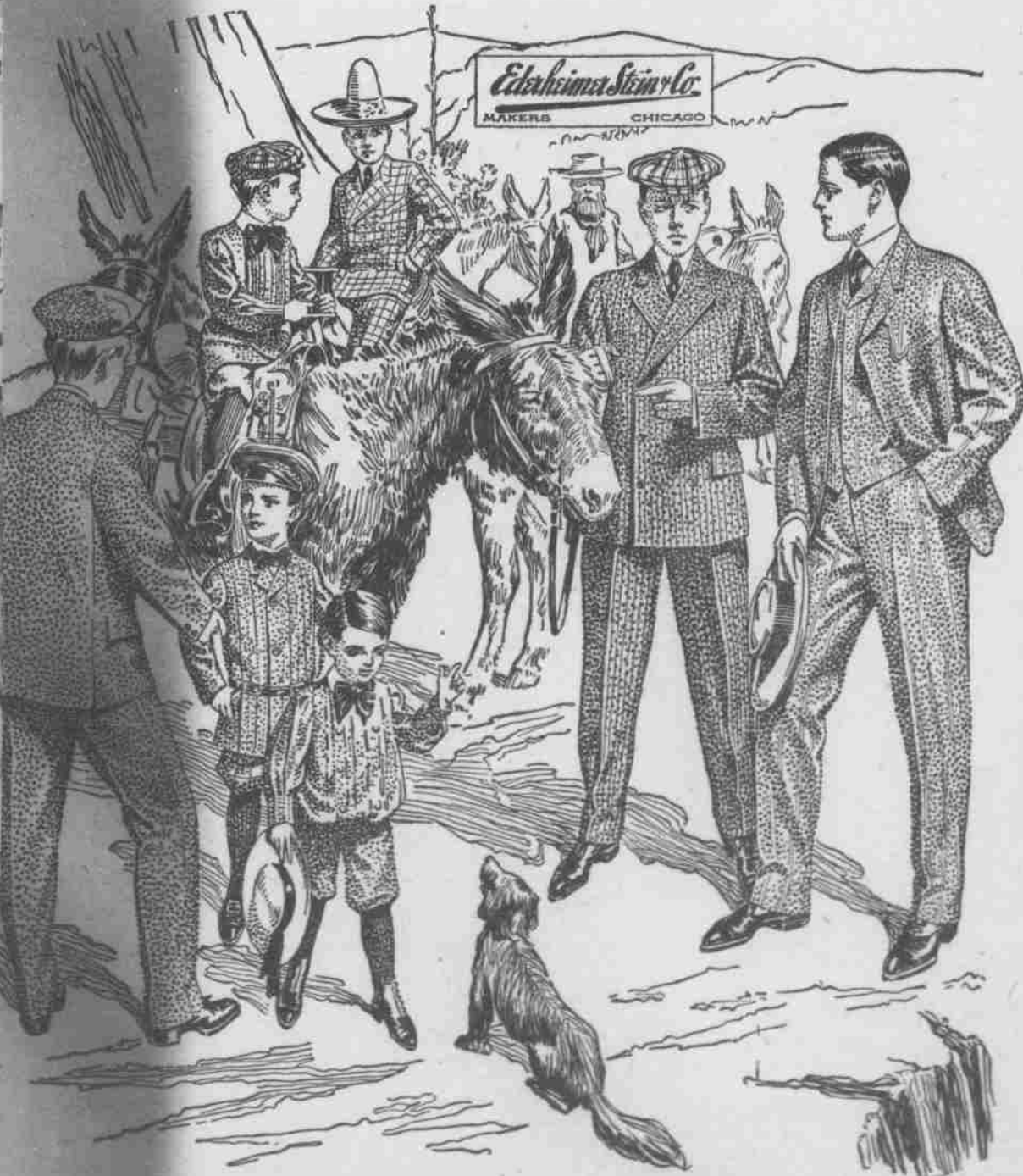
