CAR TOO SMALL

Gasoline Motor Will Not Be Operated on Portland-Hillsboro Run.

Hopes of residents along the West Side branch of the Southern Pacific have been blasted so far as they concerned the new gasoline motor car, for it was proved Friday that conveyance was entirely too small for the demands of the route, as but 24 passengers can be carried. Superintendent L. R. Fields, of the Oregon lines of the Southern Pacific, was in charge of the car which was hauled up the Fourth street grade by an engine and started from South Portland for Forest Grove. On the way a brass band was picked up at one of the stations and several prominent residents along the line were invited to make the trip.

A short stay was made there, and then the car was brought back. Saturday it was taken to the Jefferson-street depot and a test made to see if the car could haul a coach to be used as a trailer, but before a mile of track had been covered one of the cylinders gave out and further attempts were abandoned until Monday morning. It is not known where the car will be placed in service now, but if a trailer can be used the car will probably be placed on a branch where there is no grade.
