### Summer Normal at Monmouth.

The Oregon State Normal School will conduct a summer school in Monmouth, beginning June 26 and continuing to August 4. While the chief object is to prepare students for the county and state examinations, the instruction in each branch will include some discussion of the methods of teaching in the public schools.

In addition to the subjects required for county and state papers, classes will be organized in other branches of the regular Normal course, as required. Special attention will be given to principals and teachers in small high schools.

If desired, private individual instruction will be given at reasonable rates. This will accommodate those who feel the need of more time than is devoted to general class instruction in a six weeks term.

Private individual and class lessons will also be given in the state course in vocal music and drawing; in voice culture, piano, organ and harmony; and in violin and other string instruments.

The tuition for the six-weeks' course has been placed at \$7.50. Board can be obtained at low rates in private homes or at the Dining Hall.

## LAWYERS MAY TALK LONG

Supreme Court Decides That Judge Cannot Limit Time for Argument Before Jury.

That to talk as long as he pleases is one of the inalienable rights of a lawyer, is the substance of a decision given by the supreme court of Oregon Monday. By limiting the time for argument, a court transgresses the toes of justice. If a client's interests demand, a lawyer may talk like a legislator on day's pay, trying to stave off adjournment.

All this is apropos of the action of the state supreme court in reversing the decision in the Oscar Rogoway arson case and granting a new trial.

Rogoway was convicted of burning a store at Lebanon, Oregon. At the trial Judge Burnett limited the argument of the counsel to one hour on each side. Exception was taken to this ruling and one of the defendant's attorneys refused to address the jury because he averred the time allotted was too short.

After conviction the defendant appealed and the supreme court affirmed the judgment.

Later a re-hearing was granted, and the supreme court now decides from its position, holding that in a criminal case like this occupying three days in the examination of 21 witnesses, one hour is not sufficient time for the counsel to present its case before the jury.
