PROMOTION IS RAPID

Former Dallas Boy is Winning Fame as a Draftsman in San Francisco.

A former Dallas boy who is achieving great success in his chosen occupation is Frank Collins, a son of Judge and Mrs. J. L. Collins. He writes his father that he has been placed at the head of the drafting department of one of the largest elevator companies in San Francisco, with a fine suite of office rooms and a handsome salary.

Four years ago Frank was a student of Dallas College. Desiring to learn the machinist's trade, he left school at the age of 18 years and went to San Francisco, where he contracted to serve a four years' apprenticeship in the shops of the Union Iron Works. In addition to his work as a machinist, he took a course in drafting and made rapid advancement, receiving his certificate as a Master Machinist in May of the present year.

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LONG DISTANCE MUTUALS

Farmers' Telephone Lines May Be Permitted to Build into Portland This Fall.

The Home Telephone Company, that got a franchise at the last June election to build an automatic telephone system in Portland, has just bought at the corner of Park and Burnside streets a corner lot 100x115 feet, at a cost of \$30,000, and will erect a \$70,000 building. As the appliances are heavy for the automatic system, a more staple and permanent building will have to be had than for the ordinary switchboard.

Work will begin about the 20th of this month on the conduits, which are built of vitrified tile, with three-inch holes, laid under ground in cement so as to be absolutely water proof, with man holes at each street crossing. Through each tile a lead cable is pulled with 300 copper wires, and spliced at each street crossing to the desired length.

It is expected that a long distance line from Corvallis to Portland will be built during the fall months, connecting with the Independent system. W. D. DeVarney is connected with the Home Telephone Company, as well as the Independent of this city.—Corvallis Gazette.
