Holman and Mrs. J. G. Brown are in Portland, attending the Fair. A new locomotive for the Dallas and Falls City railroad was brought up from Portland yesterday. The preaching services at the Pres- byterian church will be suspended during the month of August, and Dr. Thompson will take a vacation, most of which will be spent at home in Independence.—West Side. Charles Rice and family, Mrs. James Hayes and children, Mrs. C. G. Coad and children, Mrs. D. M. Metzger and son, Norval, and Miss Nora Robertson are camping on the banks of the LaCreole river, near the Hallock mill. Citizens of the thriving town of Falls City will meet tomorrow evening to discuss the advisability of putting in a system of waterworks. Mountain water can be piped into the town at a small cost, and it is believed that a large majority of citizens will favor the improvement. Rev. S. J. Becker, of Waupaca, Wisconsin, has accepted a call from the First Presbyterian church of Dallas, and will arrive here to take up his work about September 1. The church has been without a pastor since the departure of Rev. W. T. Wardle to Lebanon early in the sum- mer. Rev. Becker comes well recom- mended as an able and interesting speaker. Since installing the new machinery at the power station of the Dallas electric light plant, the company re- ports a noticeable increase of patron- age. Many dwelling houses are being wired, and orders for light are ex- pected to come in at a more rapid rate as the winter season approaches. Manager Thompson says that he will run a wire to Germantown, if sufficient encouragement is offered by the people of that addition.

The hum of the thresher is heard in the land. Mrs. George H. Wilkes, of Florence, Colorado, is visiting her parents, Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Thompson. The infant daughter of Dr. and Mrs. H. E. Kelly died at the family home in Salem, Wednesday. The burial occurred at Bethel cemetery yesterday afternoon. The Pacific States Telephone line- men are making many substantial and desirable improvements on the company's lines in Dallas by putting in longer and heavier poles and re- arranging the wires. All poles in the business streets have been replaced, and the linemen are now working in the residence district. A brush fire broke out on the mountain between Frank Butler's ranch and the Teal sawmill early in the week, and has burned over an area of ten or fifteen acres. No timber has been destroyed, the fire being confined to a tract of land logged off by Mr. Teal several years ago. Men are closely watching the fire to pre- vent a further spread, and it is be- lieved to be under control. C. B. Mayhugh, of Mansfield, Ohio, an expert brick maker and clay worker, returned to Dallas from Port- land this week. He was here about three weeks ago and examined the immense deposits of shale in the hills west of town, with a view of putting in a brick factory if suitable clay could be found. Since leaving Dal- las he has made a thorough test of this shale and finds that it makes an excellent building brick. Mr. May- hugh returns to Dallas at this time to make a further examination of these shale deposits, and may decide to put in a brick-making plant here this Fall.

Weekly Crop Report. The Government crop bulletin for the week ending August 8 says: "Fall wheat and barley yields continue good, both in quantity and quality, but spring wheat is not coming up to expectations, especially in the Willam- ette valley, where rust and the aphides were so plentiful earlier in the season. The straw of spring wheat and oats was heavy and the heads, as a rule, of average size, but the berries in many cases are shriveled, which accounts for the shortage. Pasturage is very short in the valleys, but continues fairly good in the mountain ranges, and stock keeps in unusually good condi- tion. All streams are falling and the water supply for irrigation is getting scarce. Hops show improvement and the lice have nearly all disappeared. The dry weather is causing prunes and plums to drop more than usual at this season of the year." The Polk county courthouse lawn is admired not only by the people of Dallas but by every visitor to the town. Notwithstanding the fact that the grounds were seeded less than a year ago, the lawn presents the smooth, velvety appearance so much sought after and usually brought about only after years of close care and attention. County Treasurer J. E. Beesley has charge of the work of keeping the grounds in order, and has given proof of more than ordinary skill as a landscape gardener.
