The peach crop in Polk county this year is larger than it has been for many years past.

According to the most reliable estimates now available the total wheat yield of the Northwest this year will be between 45,000,000 and 50,000,000 bushels. This is a trifle better than last year's yield, which was regarded as a splendid crop. Threshing has begun in Northeastern Oregon and Southeastern Washington, and results are very good, the wheat averaging 35 bushels to the acre. Shipments are beginning in Umatilla county.
