DALLAS COLLEGE OPENS
Prospects Bright For an Enrollment
Of One Hundred and Fifty
Students.
Dallas College opened Monday
morning with bright prospects for a
successful year's work. Informal ex-
ercises were held in the college chapel,
and were largely attended by friends
and patrons of the school. Dr. C. C.
Poling, president of the college, gave
an interesting address to the students,
outlining the year's work and pre-
sented a report of his labors in the
Eastern States in behalf of the endow-
ment fund. Dr. Charles Mock, the
new member of the faculty, who will
have charge of the department of
ancient languages and literature, cre-
ated a favorable impression upon
the audience in a 15-minute address.
Dr. Mock comes highly recommended
as an able instructor. Informal talks
by Dean Metzger and other members
of the faculty closed the exercises.
The afternoon was devoted to the
enrollment of students. The college
begins its work with a larger atten-
dance than that of any former opening
day, and it is believed that the total
enrollment will reach 150 students as
soon as the hockeypicking season is over.
The number of old students returning
is unusually large. Strong work is
assured in literary societies and
on the athletic field.
President Poling has spent the last
18 months in the Atlantic States, in
the interest of Dallas College, and the
endowment fund is growing rapidly
as a result of his labors. Wealthy
men who are interested in the work of
small colleges are considering the
merits of the claims presented by the
Dallas school, and have assured Presi-
dent Poling that the college may
count upon receiving substantial aid
before the close of the present year.

President Poling Returns.
Rev. C. C. Poling, Ph. D., president of Dallas College, accompanied by his family, arrived home Saturday from a 15 months' stay in Johnston, Pa. They are all in good health, and are glad to get back to Oregon. During Dr. Poling's stay in Johnston, he was the pastor of one of the largest churches in the city and was offered strong inducements to remain permanently, but he preferred to return to Dallas and take up his work in the college. As a result of his year's work in the East, the endowment fund of the college has been materially strengthened, and further substantial aid is assured. In addition to his duties as president of the school, Dr. Poling has taken charge as pastor of the United Evangelical Church of Dallas. He occupied the pulpit for the first time, Sunday, and preached two able sermons. Accompanying Dr. Poling and family on the trip to Oregon was Dr. C. A. Mock, Ph. D., who becomes a member of the college faculty as teacher of languages.
