POLK'S PROUD PORTION

Wool and Mohair Industries Flourish Here as Nowhere Else in Oregon.

In an illustrated descriptive article, entitled "Polk's Proud Portion," the Sunday Oregonian pays a fine tribute to the banner mohair county of Oregon. That paper says:

"To Polk County, Oregon, is due the proud position of having been one of the counties which has brought the state to the fore in the production of fine mohair and wool. In the county's exhibit in the Agricultural building, long, silky strands of crinkly wool adorn the walls of the booth and represent one of the leading industries of the county.

"As headquarters for high-bred sheep and goats, and for extensive knowledge in all branches of this industry, Polk county has become the eyecore for the eyes of breeders in all parts of the world. In the contests against the breeders of the world, held at the international exhibitions during the last quarter century, Polk county has in nearly all instances secured high prizes and medals for the showing of wool and mohair. This blood which has brought to the county so much fame and incidentally, so many good, hard dollars, originally came from England, and because of the equable climate of the county and the peculiarly adaptable condition of soil and water, the fleecy foreigners and their descendants waxed fat, and proudly kept the names of Cotswold, Lincoln and Angora high up on the rolls of woolly aristocracy.

"Where there are many sheep and goats, there must also be a plenitude of the best forage grasses and grains. And in this, too, Polk county is fortunate. The county is out with the claim that nowhere else does alfalfa grow as luxuriantly as in Polk—18 feet in length. A root of this excellent cattle food is on exhibit at the Exposition, and there have been roots on display, which were 65 feet long.

"The dollars do not only walk around on four cloven feet in Polk county, but they come out of the udders of the cows, and are hatched from the eggs of the chickens, and grow on the hop vines, and on the many kinds of fruit trees and in the wheat and oats fields. And in the standing forest timber of the county the dollars are also a potential wealth. Polk claims the finest woods in the world, and a glance at the display of polished poles at the Fair will do much to bolster up this claim. There are now, it is claimed, quarter sections within the confines of the county which will yield from 2,000,000 to 10,000,000 feet of lumber."

GETS PRISON AND FINE Judge Hunt Sentences Congressman Williamson to Serve Ten Months in Jail.

Ten months' imprisonment and a fine of \$500 was the sentence pronounced upon Congressman J. N. Williamson in the United States court Saturday by Judge Hunt of Montana, when Mr. Williamson and his associates in the trial appeared for sentence. Calmly, with his hands in his pockets, a serene look upon his face and without a flinch, the Eastern Oregon congressman and sheep rancher took his sentence, and when asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced upon him he answered laconically:

"I guess it has all been said, judge."

Marion R. Biggs, the United States commissioner, who was also sentenced, received the same sentence, and Dr. VanGesner, Williamson's partner in the sheep business, who is old and in ill health, was given five months in the county jail and a fine of \$1,000 was exacted from him.

Judge Bennett, counsel for Congressman Williamson, interposed an objection on the ground that his client was a member of congress, and the imposing of sentence would interfere with his attendance at Washington and conflict with his constitutional rights. This was overruled. On application of the defendant's attorneys, stay of judgment was granted, pending the perfecting of an appeal.
