

ARE NOT INSOLVENT

Trust Deed Given by Krebs Brothers Was For Purpose of Borrowing Money.

Krebs Brothers, the well-known hop growers of Polk and Marion counties, have given out the following statement for publication:

"For the benefit of our friends and business associates, and incidentally for the purpose of satisfying the curiosity of the gossips as well as to correct malicious false statements published in some newspapers of the state, we make the following statement concerning our affairs. One paper stated that we owed Ladd & Bush \$180,000; and another that we were unable to meet all our obligations. Neither of them are correct or worthy of further consideration.

"We would like to know of a just obligation which we are unable or have refused to meet. We invite all our creditors, who by actual count are three in number, to present their bills, and we shall pay them. The sum we owe Ladd & Bush is insignificant in comparison to the large amount of property we own. The trust deed which we have given the bank was given for the purpose of securing them for what we owe, as well as to enable us to borrow whenever our business requires it, without the necessity of giving a mortgage. As the trust deed only operated as a mortgage, we are still the owners of the property.

"The newspapers have also failed to mention the property which we own in Tillamook County, Oregon; the state of Idaho; the city of Chicago, and in the state of Texas. It is true we have lost some money the past year, but not nearly so much as is accredited to us. It always seems to be the fashion of some publications to exaggerate the actual facts and jump on one whom they think is down. Any one speculating extensively must be prepared to sustain heavy losses as well as to reap large profits. We have accumulated a large amount of property, all of which was made on speculation.

"In conclusion, we want to thank our numerous friends for the unsolicited expressions of sympathy and volunteer offers of aid, and we assure them that we shall continue to do business at the same old stand, in the same old way, on the same old farms, with possibly a few new additions from time to time, and we shall continue to hold and control the sale of over 2000 bales of hops of the old and new crop until next Spring, unless the market should advance materially in the meantime.

ELEVEN CENTS OFFERED

Over Five Hundred Bales of Hops Change Hands in Independence District.

The persistence of buyers is finally breaking into the holdings of hops in the Independence district, says the Independence correspondent of the Oregonian. Over 500 bales were let go Saturday. The largest sale made, which is also the largest sale of the season, was the R. D. Cooper crop of 339 bales. Wolf & Sons were the buyers, and the price paid was 10 cents. It was of this lot that Klaber, Wolf & Netter bought 103 bales and declined to accept. The sale Saturday includes all grades raised on the Cooper place.

J. M. Miller sold 36 bales to Klaber, Wolf & Netter, at 10 cents. Hopkins & Collins disposed of 49 bales of primes to T. A. Livesley & Co. at 8 cents. George Whiteaker has verbally agreed to sell his crop of 123 bales. A buyer has offered him his price, and the trade will go through, provided there is no disagreement as to quality. Charles Livesley, representing Clem Horst, purchased Thomas Pomeroy's crop. The price paid is a matter of speculation. It is known Pomeroy was offered 11 cents a few days ago, and it is not likely a less figure was taken. Pomeroy's lot consisted of 95 bales.

The attitude of growers who have not yet sold is rather independent, and some of those who let go express the opinion that they made a mistake. W. E. Bevins and Mart Serafini were each offered 11 cents Saturday, and declined it. Richard McCarthy has set his figure at 13 cents, and declares he will sell when hops reach that price, and not before.
