DRIVE OUT THE FOREIGNER

**Prominent California Hop Grower
Endorses Plan Proposed by
E. C. Kirkpatrick.**

M. H. Durst, a well-known hop
grower of Alameda, California, writes
the Oregonian as follows:

"I have just been enjoying the re-
ports in your issue of the 28th from
the hopgrowers about the advisability
of reducing the acreage for the 1906
crop.

"Although as long ago as in your
issue of November 14 I suggested the
advisability of leaving half of the
hop acreage go fallow for 1906, yet in
the light of later discussion I rather
feel as if the stand taken by E. C.
Kirkpatrick might be a wiser one in
the long run. He says: 'Why do we
let the foreigner drive us out of busi-
ness when we should do the driving?'

He advocates growing hops as cheaply
as possible consistent with producing
quality. To all of which I say, amen!
There are sales being made in Cali-
fornia at 5 to 7 cents. The hops are
poor stuff, dirtily picked, poorly
handled. They are a dead loss to the
owners. The sooner such hop pro-
ducers go out of business the better
for the rest of us. Dealers quote these
purchasers and want our hops at 9 1/2
to 10 cents, but we are inclined to wait
awhile before we sell for the mere cost
of production.

"The legitimate outcome of Mr. Kirk-
patrick's suggestion is that Pacific
Coast hopgrowers can if they grow
the quality, force European hop-
growers out of the business.

"I believe that we can do this even
with a freight tariff of 2 1/2 to 3 cents
per lb., as it now is. But when the
canal is built and we can lay our hops
down in London for less than 1 cent
per pound, freight and insurance, we
will surely be able to grow hops and
deliver them to consumers at a price
no foreigner can compete with.

"This is the future of hopgrowing
on the Pacific Coast. Ten years is not
long to wait. We have grown hops
for 32 years and expect to be in the
business when the canal is dug. Our
hopgrowers must compete with the
world. They must be aggressive.
They should unite to fight gambling
in their crops by outsiders, also to
push competition in foreign countries.

"The hopgrower of Oregon is just at
a point where he must do something.
Cutting down acreage is only a tem-
porary relief, and which would re-
sult to the credit of our foreign
competitors. Burning the surplus, as
advocated by a grower not long ago,
might give temporary relief, but it
would help the foreigner more than
the man who burned his hops. On the
other hand, to grow a full crop and
export the surplus, even at a loss,
every year for three or four years,
would relieve the home market, keep
prices up here, and eventually result
in nearly wiping out hopgrowing as
an English and European industry.

"Then every hop grown on the
Pacific Coast would be in strong de-
mand at good prices.

"It is for these reasons I advise ex-
porting 20,000 to 25,000 bales of hops
now in growers' hands. Every grower
show stand in and help in propor-
tion to his holdings. Even if we sell
at a loss we will win out on our home
holdings."
