Central Oregon Railroad.

Central Oregon will be opened to the world by railroad transportation facilities as soon as the preliminary lines can be run from Natron through the Cascade mountains. Construction has been authorized by Mr. Harrison, from his Eastern offices, of a line 162 miles in length, reaching from Natron along the Middle Fork of the Willamette river, through the Cascade mountains to the Klamath Falls district. It is expected that the first construction gangs will be started to work in early spring, as soon as the weather of the mountain country will permit of such work to be done. Fall will see the first trains running over the new line. For this construction, the Harriman system has set aside \$4,160,000. This sum, if all is used, will make the average cost of construction something over \$27,000 a mile.

Another Pioneer Gone.

Mrs. Lucinda Caldwell, widow of Thomas Caldwell, died of paralysis at the home of her son in McMinnville, on Friday, December 8. She was born in Boone county, Missouri, in 1819, and was married to Thomas Caldwell on September 2, 1838. She was the mother of nine children, four of whom survive her. They are: S. H. Caldwell, of Colorado; J. W. Caldwell, of Dallas; D. M. Caldwell, of McMinnville; Mrs. M. C. Cline, of Jasper City, Mo. Mrs. Caldwell was a faithful member of the Christian church for more than 60 years. She was buried on her grandfather's donation claim, in the McBride cemetery, west of Carlton.
