MR. BOURNE WINS.

The nomination of Jonathan Bourne for United States Senator was the big surprise of the primary election. Early returns gave H. M. Calk a lead of over 1000 votes and it was believed by all that this lead could not be overcome. For three days Mr. Calk had been receiving telegrams of congratulation from his friends in Oregon, and the news was sent to all parts of the United States that Calk had won the nomination. Mr. Bourne, himself, had conceded his defeat and had given Mr. Calk assurances of his hearty support. The late returns which gave the nomination to Bourne therefore came as a surprise to every voter in the state.

The OREGONIAN was a supporter of Mr. Calk, and used every honorable means to secure his nomination. It favored Mr. Calk because it believed him to be the most suitable candidate for the office. But Mr. Bourne is the nominee of the Republican party, and, as such, is entitled to Republican support. Senator Gearin stands for Democratic principles; Mr. Bourne stands for Republican principles; therefore, the OREGONIAN will take pleasure in supporting Mr. Bourne.

As our readers are aware, the OREGONIAN has never favored the Direct Primary Law; neither has it favored Statement No. 1. But the present time is not the proper time for a discussion of these measures. The people have expressed their wishes at the polls, and the candidates chosen by the Republican voters are entitled to Republican support at the June election.

Mr. Bourne has conducted a vigorous and skillful campaign, and has amply demonstrated his ability to accomplish what he undertakes. The result of this energy and efficiency in Washington would be felt for the great good of Oregon, and the people would have the satisfaction of knowing that their interests would not be neglected.

The nominations for state officers are highly pleasing to the OREGONIAN. All the candidates are men of high integrity and ability, and the business affairs of the state will be safe in their hands. The ticket is well distributed geographically, and every candidate is worthy of the support of his party. INDEPENDENCE NOTES

D. G. Dove has purchased the Locke drugstore and will continue the business.

Warren Ferguson died at the home of his mother, Wednesday, after a lingering illness. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at the Baptist church. He left an aged mother, brothers and a sister.

The people of this community have responded liberally to the call for help for the San Francisco sufferers. Two carloads of provisions and supplies of various kinds were forwarded, and it is believed that another car will be secured. At a special meeting of the city council, Tuesday evening, \$250 was voted as a gift from the city. About \$700 in cash has been subscribed, making in all about \$1000, including provisions.

Mrs. Susan Merwin died at her home in Independence at 5:45 o'clock Thursday morning. She was sick only a few hours before her death. She was an Oregon pioneer, and was 85 years old. She was born in Ohio, in February 16, 1821, and was married to Edwin Merwin in 1837. She was the mother of 11 children, five of whom are still living. Her son, Marsh Merwin, is Postmaster at Independence. The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. E. J. Thompson at the home at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Burial will take place in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

"Holy Rolling" Again.

Creffield, the sounder who poses as a saint, passed through Benton county Saturday, and followed by some of his former victims, is again at his old tricks in a camp near Waldport. This time he is palming himself off on his foolish followers as Jesus Christ risen from the dead, his resurrection having been his emergence from the state penitentiary. Some of his followers are said to accept him as the Risen Christ. Creffield's trip through Benton was by private conveyance from Airlie, Polk county, to Wren, Benton county. According to all accounts, a camp is to be established near Waldport and a revelry in rollerism carried on. Creffield was accompanied by his wife. She was divorced from him last year, but they were re-married in Seattle several weeks ago.—Corvallis Times.
