All signs point to a crowded house at Mrs. Cherrington's Song Recital, to be given in Woodman Hall next Thursday evening. The advance sale of seats has been large, and many inquiries concerning the entertainment have been received from all the neighboring towns. Arrangements are being made for a special motor to accommodate the people of Independence and Monmouth, and tickets are now on sale in each of these towns. Mr. Hirschberg has generously offered a round trip rate of 40 cents from Independence and 35 cents from Monmouth, and it is expected that a large number of people will avail themselves of these low rates to hear some of the best musical talent that has ever been brought to Polk county.

The people of Dallas have had the privilege of hearing some of Oregon's best singers during the past winter, and have shown their pleasure and appreciation by liberal patronage. Encouraged by this display of appreciation of first-class talent, Mrs. Cherrington has undertaken to bring Mrs. E. E. Covert and Mr. Arthur Alexander to Dallas, believing that a sufficient number of tickets can be sold to justify the expense. Mrs. Cherrington will also take part in the recital as a pupil. This will be pleasing news to many friends who will be interested in noting the progress she has made in her vocal studies during the past year. The entire program will be one of exceptional merit.

Mrs. E. E. Covert is one of Portland's most popular singers. She is the possessor of a mezzo-soprano voice of rare quality, and sings with a charm that captivates her hearers. Fresh from her musical studies in some of the leading cities in Europe, Mrs. Covert's recent recital in her old home town of Vancouver, Wash., was one of the most successful musical events ever held in the Northwest. She is a pupil of Frau Auer-Herbeck, of Dresden, Germany, and has also had the personal coaching of L. Charles Sparks, the famous baritone of that city. Upon her return to Portland, Mrs. Covert consented to teach a limited number of pupils, and Mrs. Cherrington was so fortunate as to become one of this number.

Of Mr. Arthur Alexander, few words in the way of an introduction are necessary. Although a resident of Portland only a few months, where he is the choir leader at the Cathedral, his fame has spread throughout the state and the press has united in pronouncing him the greatest lyric tenor in the Northwest. His pronunciation was admirable. The concert was one of the finest of the year.
