WINNIE SCOTT IS DEAD

Well-Known Stockman Passes Away at His Home in Malheur County.

The sad news comes from Vale, Oregon, that Winnie Scott, a prominent stockman of Malheur county, died of heart disease at his home near Beulah on Thursday, May 31. No word has been received in Dallas from his relatives, and the only particulars obtainable are found in a meager account of his death published in the Vale Oriole. That paper says:

"Universal sadness prevails throughout the entire country from the sudden death of M. W. Scott, which occurred at Beulah, Thursday evening, May 31. The particulars as we learn them are that after riding all day after stock, he dropped dead from heart disease soon after reaching home. He was a native of Oregon, and was 44 years old.

"Each individual feels this as a personal loss. Everyone knew him. Everyone knew his kind, upright, manly nature. Everyone loved the man as a warm personal friend."

Winnie Scott was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Scott, honored pioneers of Polk county. His boyhood days were spent in and around Dallas and on his father's farm. He attended school at LaCreole Academy, where he was a leader in athletic sports and games, and was popular among his schoolmates. When he reached the age of manhood, he went to Eastern Oregon and engaged in stockraising on an extensive scale. He is survived by two brothers and three sisters. Mrs. Clara Burson, the oldest sister, has been making her home with him.
