By mutual agreement between the publisher of the OBSERVER and V. P. Fiske, the new publisher of the Itemizer, a change will be made in the time of publication of each paper. Mr. U'Ren has demonstrated that he is a peculiarly smooth and able politician by the manner in which he has worked up a scheme of laws and secured their adoption, changing the entire character of the constitution and of the governmental scheme of this state. Oregon was originally organized along lines of conservatism, with a constitutional document based very largely on that other Magna Charta of the nation, Mr. U'Ren, in a few brief years, solely and alone, has changed that document until today it is the most radical of any document of its character existing in the United States. In no other state of the Union is it possible for five per cent and eight per cent of the voters of the state, which may comprise at any time the absolutely irresponsible and purchasable element, to hold up any law for two years which the legislative assembly might see fit to erect, or to demand the submission to the people of any proposition, however dangerous may be its character, and thus to cause the spirit of unrest and lack of confidence which may at some time have such influence on the state as to very materially retard its advancement.—Salem Statesman.

The destruction of San Francisco, and its proposed and prosecuted rebuilding, have caused an abnormal demand for Portland cement, and other causes, among them an unprecedented amount of building in Portland, have accentuated the discrepancy between the demand and supply in Pacific coast cities during the past few weeks. Which leads to the inquiry: Could this material, or something just as good, be manufactured at or near home?—Portland Journal.

The OBSERVER believes that the stone in the foothills west of Dallas would furnish a first-class quality of building cement. This stone has been tested for cement purposes by Eastern experts, and the samples appear to be equal in hardness and durability to the best imported cement. It is possible that it might be necessary to add a small percentage of lime to this cement to give it the proper cohesive qualities, but it is believed by those who have examined the Dallas stone that if any lime were needed at all, the cost would be so small that the cement could be manufactured at a figure below the price charged for cement imported from Europe. The quantity of this stone is unlimited, and it is all easy of access. The nearest quarry is less than three miles from the Southern Pacific railroad at Dallas, and the trains of the Dallas and Falls City railroad pass within about one mile of it. A spur could be built from the main line of the latter railroad to the quarry at a small cost. We believe the project of developing these quarries for cement purposes is well worthy of careful investigation.

The State Normal School at Monmouth has closed another useful and prosperous year's work. The enrollment was larger than for many years, 283 students, and the list of graduates included 46 names. The school was not seriously hampered by the hold-up of the appropriation bill, for the reason that it has a place to fill in the educational system of Oregon, and is filling it well.

In many counties, the Sheriff's office was the only one captured by the Democrats.

WILL BUILD BRICK BLOCK

Dr. B. H. McCallion Will Erect Large Store Building on Main Street.

Dr. B. H. McCallion is preparing to build a substantial brick store building on his Main street lot, recently purchased from B. E. Williams. Architect F. H. Morrison is drawing the plans for the new structure, and the contract will be let as soon as this work is finished.

The new building will be erected on the lot now occupied by Kerslake's furniture store. It will have a frontage of 50 feet and a depth of 80 feet. Only one story will be built this summer, but the foundation and walls will be made heavy enough to support at least two additional stories. The building will have a fine plate-glass front and will be strictly modern in every respect.

The new brick will be occupied by Frank Kerslake, the house furnisher, who has agreed to lease the property for five years. Mr. Kerslake will move his furniture stock into the Carter warehouse on Oak street, and will conduct his business there while the construction work is going on. After the completion of the brick building, he will open out a new and greatly enlarged stock.

The new brick will add greatly to the appearance of the district in which it is to be located. It is hoped that Dr. McCallion's enterprise in putting up this building will induce other property-owners in the block to make similar improvements in the near future.

KIND WORDS WELL SAID

The Albany Herald Adds to a News Item Some Deserved Praise of a Worthy Young Man.

Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, of Klamath Falls, one of the leading physicians of that section of the state spent last evening in Albany and will leave this morning for Salem and Portland for a couple of days' stay before returning home. Dr. Steiner was for the past few years interested in the Detroit Sawmill Company, but yesterday sold the mill and the timber lands connected with it to a new firm at a good figure.

Dr. Steiner is one of the physicians of the new government hospital at Klamath Falls. He is a physician of great ability and has attracted the favorable attention of the Federal authorities. He was for a number of years a resident of Lakeview and represented the district of which Lakeview county is a part in the legislature, making an enviable record for himself and for his section of the state. In Salem, where his early life was spent, Dr. Steiner is known as the "Old German Doctor," but this is a misnomer, for he is a young man, though old in experience, and has many years of a useful life before him.
