INCREASED TRAIN SERVICE
Morning Passenger Train From Portland to Dallas Will Be Put On About July 1.
Dallas' already good train service is to be made better by the addition of a morning passenger train from Portland. The people of this city already have a morning train service over the West Side division, by way of Derry and Independence, but the new train is to run direct to Dallas over the Yamhill division. The exact date of the new schedule will be announced later, but the plans have been matured, and it is probable that the new train will be put on about July 1.
The morning train will leave the Jefferson street depot in Portland daily at 8:30 o'clock and will arrive in Dallas at 11:45 a. m. Returning, the train will leave Dallas at 3:15 p. m., reaching Portland at 6:30 p. m. The arrangements for motor connection between this train and Independence and Monmouth have not been announced.
The addition of this train will make Dallas the most important railroad terminal in the Willamette Valley. When the new schedule is put into effect, the hours of the arrival and departure of trains will be as follows:
Yamhill division—Trains will leave Dallas for Portland, via McMinnville and Newberg, at 7 a. m. and 3:15 p. m. Trains will arrive from Portland, via McMinnville and Newberg, at 11:45 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.
West Side division, via Independence motor and Derry stage—Leave Dallas for Corvallis, Albany and Southern Oregon points at 9:45 a. m. Leave Dallas for Portland, via McMinnville and Hillsboro, at 1 p. m. Arrive in Dallas from Corvallis and Albany, via Derry stage, at 3:35 p. m. Arrive in Dallas from Portland, via Derry or Independence, at 11:45 a. m.
Independence & Monmouth motor—Arrive from Independence and Monmouth at 8:40 a. m., 11:45 a. m. and 6:55 p. m. Arrive from Lewisville and Airlie at 11:45 a. m. Leave Dallas for Independence, Monmouth and Airlie at 9:45 a. m. and 1 p. m. Leave Dallas for Independence and Monmouth at 7:35 p. m.
Dallas and Falls City railroad—Leave Dallas for Falls City at 7:30 a. m. and 1:20 p. m. Arrive in Dallas from Falls City at 9:20 a. m. and 4:40 p. m.
The foregoing will be the correct train schedule after July 1, unless changes are made in the schedules on the West Side division and motor line. The new morning train from Portland will be a great convenience to the people in the north end of Polk county, as it will enable them to visit Dallas and return home the same day.
The Southern Pacific Company will make another important change on July 1, when it will begin running daily freight trains to Dallas over the Yamhill division. The freight train on this road now makes trips from Portland every other day. The daily freight will run no farther south than Dallas, and the motor will continue to handle the Southern Pacific Company's freight business between Dallas and Airlie. The hours of departure and arrival of the daily freight will remain the same as at present. The new freight train will cause the train crew to stop over in Dallas every night, instead of every other night, and it is probable that the members of the crew having families will move them from Portland to Dallas, which will mean a substantial addition to the population of the town.

Street Improvement Notice.

To Mrs. M. E. Smith: Notice is hereby given, that the City Council of the City of Dallas, Oregon, contemplates the passage of an ordinance requiring the improvement of certain streets or parts of streets herein described, as follows, to-wit: A new sidewalk 12 feet in width on the East side of that part of Main street adjacent to and adjoining that certain lot or part of lot or parcel of ground, described as beginning at the Southwest corner of block No. 8 of the original town (now city) of Dallas, Oregon, and running thence North 50 feet; thence East 75 feet; thence South 50 feet; thence West 75 feet to place of beginning.
That said sidewalk will be constructed of lumber at the time and in the manner to be hereafter prescribed by said Ordinance.
That the cost of said sidewalk will be assessed to the above described property fronting and abutting thereon.
That the City Council of said city will sit in the Council Chamber in said city on the 2nd day of July, A. D. 1906 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to hear and determine objections and remonstrances thereto, if any there be; and
That all owners and other persons in interest, may attend at said time and place and show cause, if any they have, why said sidewalks should not be constructed.
