**STILL ANOTHER SAWMILL**  
 Oberer-Myer Company Will Build  
 Fine Mill in Mountains Near  
 Falls City.

A new sawmill with a capacity of 20,000 feet of lumber a day is the latest addition to Polk county's rapidly growing list of manufacturing industries. The new firm is known as the Oberer-Myer Lumber Company, and the mill will be located in the timber three miles west of Falls City. The proprietors are both experienced sawmill men. E. A. Myers is a resident of Portland, and F. J. Oberer formerly owned and operated the Charter Oak sawmill in the hills south of Monmouth.

The site selected for the new mill is in township 7 south, range 8 west, and is within 300 yards of the Dallas and Falls City railroad track. The claim on which the mill will stand was formerly owned by Mrs. A. M. Hurley, of Independence, and is in the heart of a fine body of yellow and red fir timber. The timber within easy reach of the mill is estimated at 7,000,000 feet. The entire product of the mill will be shipped to eastern and southern markets, and the company already has orders on hand to cover the output for a year.

Work on the mill buildings will be commenced in a few days, and all the machinery has been purchased. Mr. Oberer is buying a complete logging outfit and expects to begin work in the woods as soon as he can secure a logging crew.
