IMPROVED MACHINERY.

In all the years the OBSERVER has been under its present management, it has been the constant aim of the owner to keep the paper and the office equipment up to the needs of the town. We have endeavored at all times to keep pace with the progress of the community in which we are located, and on occasions have even made improvements which existing business conditions would not warrant, when judged strictly from the standpoint of immediate profit to the business office. These improvements, however, were always made for the betterment of our newspaper or to enable us to produce a larger and better class of job printing, and it is with satisfaction that we reflect that in every instance the ultimate results attained fully justified the increased investment.

Fourteen years ago, the OBSERVER newspaper was printed on a press that produced only 150 papers an hour. Seven years later, a machine with a capacity of 500 complete papers an hour was installed. Last night we stood in the press room and saw the papers coming from the press at the rate of 2000 an hour, each printed as perfectly as it is possible to print a paper on any machine known to the trade at the present day. Such speed is not necessary in the office at the present time, save in job printing, and it is probable that the newspaper will be printed at the rate of 1500 an hour, which will require only 40 minutes' time to turn out the entire edition. Last night's trial run was made for the purpose of demonstrating the capacity of the new machine. It is safe to assert that no such speed was ever attained on any newspaper press in Polk county before.

The OBSERVER office is now equipped in every department for turning out any line of first-class printing that may be offered. The job printing department has long been provided with superior facilities for producing all grades of commercial and society printing, and the customers of this office have been furnished exactly the same class of work that is produced by the best printing houses in the large cities. The claim of "a city printing office in the best country town in Oregon" has been made good by duplicating at any time any city job offered. With the improved press facilities, we will be able to turn out all kinds of book and poster printing in addition to the regular line of work.

It is hardly necessary to say that we are proud of our well equipped office. We think there is no better country printing office in Oregon, and if there is a more handsomely furnished office in the United States in a town the size of Dallas, we have never seen it. We invite our customers and friends to call and see the new machinery in operation, assuring them that they will be welcome to visit the press room at any time that suits their convenience.

CRUSHED BY HEAVY TIMBER

James Alderman Sustains Severe Internal Injuries by Falling of Hay Derrick.

James Alderman, aged about 37 years, received a complication of injuries, internally and otherwise, through the collapse of a huge hay-stacking derrick on the Donahoe place, five miles north of Salem, in Polk county, yesterday afternoon, which, if they do not prove fatal will incapacitate him from further physical exertions for several weeks to come. He is now receiving treatment, under the care of Dr. J. N. Smith, at the Salem hospital.

A crew of men were engaged in hoisting a hay-stacking derrick on the Donahoe place, better known as the old Plumb place, yesterday afternoon. When the three huge timbers, forty-eight feet long, reached a height of about sixteen feet the rope broke and the timbers fell directly upon Alderman and crushed him to the ground with their weight. Upon examination it was found that he had sustained the fracture of several ribs and other injuries to his back and internally, the exact nature of which cannot be determined and his condition is regarded as critical by the attending physicians.

Mr. Alderman is a single man and a brother of William A. Alderman, the carpenter, who resides in North Salem.—Statesman.
