### SECOND CROP BERRIES

Strawberries Marketed by T. D. Hol-  
lowell Are Well Developed  
and Highly Flavored.

The productiveness of the hill and  
 mountain land of western Polk county,  
 under careful and intelligent culti-  
 vation, is nowhere more apparent  
 than in the garden of Thomas Hollo-  
 well, at Falls City, where strawberries  
 of the second crop are being picked  
 and marketed every day. These  
 berries are unlike the average second-  
 crop growth in that they are perfectly  
 developed and of delicious flavor.  
 Two varieties, the Magoon and the  
 Australian, are now yielding the  
 second crop of the season.  
 The Australians which Mr. Hollo-  
 well considers his finest berries, were  
 obtained by him while visiting in  
 California a few years ago. One  
 dozen of these plants were purchased  
 by Mr. Hollowell from a shipment of  
 100 plants received direct from Aus-  
 tralia, and were brought to Falls City  
 and set out. Mr. Hollowell now has  
 several thousand of these rare vines  
 and believes there are no others like  
 them in Oregon. He says the Aus-  
 tralian is easily the best strawberry in  
 the world. His other two varieties  
 are the Magoon and Senator Dunlap,  
 both fine for shortcake, preserving  
 and canning purposes.  
 Mr. Hollowell is a highly successful  
 strawberry raiser, and each year  
 realizes a handsome profit on his  
 labor in cultivating and marketing  
 them. One patch of less than one-half  
 acre has netted him \$200 this season.  
 He is preparing to engage in the in-  
 dustry on a larger scale, as the de-  
 mand for his berries far exceeds the  
 supply.
