LEWIS C. PARKER DEAD
Passed Away at His Home in Portland, Tuesday, After Short Illness.
The news of the death of L. C. Parker, at his home in Portland, reached Dallas Tuesday evening and cast a gloom over the community in which he made his home for many years. Mr. Parker died of typhoid fever, after an illness of three weeks.
He was born in Akron, Ohio, August 18, 1848, and came to Dallas, Oregon in 1888. He was a pioneer in the fruit industry in this district, and his prune and apple orchards north of town were soon surrounded by other orchards of the same kind. Mr. Parker always took an especially active interest in apple raising and contributed many valuable letters on the subject to the agricultural press of the state. The display from his orchard attracted much attention and captured many prizes at the recent apple show held in Dallas.
Mr. Parker was one of the most prominent Oddfellows in the state. He was a member of Friendship Lodge, No. 6, and LaCreole Encampment, No. 20, of Dallas. He was Grand Patriarch of Ohio in 1885, and in 1887 was elected Grand Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge. He was elected Grand Master of the Oregon Jurisdiction in 1894, and Grand Representative in 1896.
He leaves a widow, one daughter, Lura V. Parker, and a son, Earl H. Parker, as well as a large circle of friends to mourn his loss.
