A REMINISCENCE OF EOLA.

New Year's day of 1907 brought to mind to a few Eolaites a very pleasant event which happened just 50 years ago on that date, the occasion being a New Year's dinner given by T. O. Waller, now of Monmouth, who at that time, was living in the residence where B. I. Ferguson now lives. Apples were a delicacy in those days, and Mr. Waller paid \$10 a bushel for 10 bushels for the occasion. He says his candy bill was something like \$25. The main bill of fare was roast pork, roast chicken, candy, nuts and apples. There were about 50 invited guests, and, so far as is known, all have passed beyond except Mr. Waller, who is now 84 years old; Mrs. Mary Gwinn and George Boothby, of Monmouth; W. H. Reason, H. M. and George Brunk, of Eola. The late H. M. Waller was the preacher here at that time, and James Gwinn was the teacher. George Brunk celebrated the 50th anniversary of the occasion by eating his New Year's dinner of 1907 in the same dining room.
