BUSINESS MEN'S MUTUAL

Dallas Merchants Favorably Impressed
With Plans Proposed for
Lower Insurance.

B. L. Barry, editor of the Dayton
Optimist, and John L. Castle, a
prominent merchant of Dayton, were
in Dallas, Monday night, in the in-
terest of the Oregon Merchants'
Mutual Insurance Association, re-
cently organized in Yamhill county.
The visitors called on the business
men of Dallas and explained the aims
and objects of the newly formed as-
sociation and, before leaving town,
appointed J. G. VanOrsdel as resi-
dent agent.
Mr. Barry says he has met an
enthusiastic reception by merchants
and other business men in his
travels over the state, and applications
for insurance and pledges of support
of the "Merchant's Mutual" have been
crowded upon him everywhere by
merchants who are seeking relief from
the excessive and burdensome rates
of the old line companies. He says
all applications received so far have
been accepted subject to the action of
meeting to be held in Dayton on Feb-
ruary 2, when the stockholders will
meet to effect permanent organization.
The proposed plan of the association
embraces:
Risks of \$1000 or less.
Two risks to a block, unless protect-
ed by fire-walls or open space.
Officers salaries and other expenses
reduced to a minimum.
To endeavor to do business at one-
half old line rates.
Cut out all hazardous risks.
Have the advice of the best business
men and insurance experts in draw-
ing up the rules.
Mr. Barry says the movement to
form a mutual association to insure
business property has met the hearty
approval of the McMinnville Mutual
Association, and that Secretary
Hagerty, of the latter organization,
has given much valuable advice as to
the formation of the new company.
The McMinnville company, as is well
known, confines its risks largely to
residence property, and now has the
largest business of any company
operating in Oregon, its outstanding
policies amounting to more than
\$25,000,000.
