HURLED TO HIS DEATH

Harry Burford Caught in Machinery and Instantly Killed at Willamette Valley Sawmill.

With the brains oozing from a fearful gash in his head, the left thigh bone broken, and a severe bruise on the right hip, the lifeless body of Harry Burford was found in the basement of the Willamette Valley Lumber Company's sawmill at 5:50 o'clock Monday evening. The discovery of the body was made by Sam Gibson, the engineer, who had seen the young man enter the basement about 10 minutes before. Death had been caused by the young man being caught by a large driving belt and hurled with great violence against one of the heavy sills of the mill building.

Young Burford was the oiler at the mill, and was engaged in his duties when the accident occurred. While no one was present when he met his death, the position of the body and the nature of the wounds plainly indicated that he had been stooping over the rapidly-moving belt and that in some manner he had been caught and thrown with terrific force against one of the sills of the building. The left thigh bone was broken, the skull was crushed above the right temple, and the face and right hip were badly bruised. It was evident that death came instantaneously. Coroner Chapman was notified and at once removed the body to his undertaking parlors.

On Tuesday morning, the Coroner summoned a jury and held an inquest. The jurors were H. G. Campbell, J. J. Williams, E. W. Fuller, H. L. Crider, I. V. Lynch and J. D. Smith. After examining several witnesses and visiting the scene of the accident, the jury returned a verdict to the effect that death was purely accidental. No blame was attached to the mill company, as it was plain that every precaution had been taken in the construction of the mill to protect the lives of the workmen.

The funeral of the young man was held from the Christian church, Wednesday afternoon and the large auditorium was filled with sorrowing relatives and friends. The mill closed down and the employees attended in a body. An appropriate sermon was preached by the pastor, Rev. A. C. Corbin.

Harry Hollis Burford was born near Dallas 28 years ago. He was the son of J. M. Burford, and a grandson of the late David and America Grant, respected pioneers of Polk county. He was a young man of quiet and retiring habits, but was honest and industrious, and enjoyed the respect of all who knew him. His sudden and tragic death was a sad blow to his father and to his many friends.
