AGED RESIDENT DIES

John A. Williams, Aged 79 Years, Joins Silent Majority.
 John A. Williams died at the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Gertie Williams, near Dallas, on Friday, February 22, aged 79 years.
 Mr. Williams was born in Indiana, February 4, 1828. He married Miss Lucinda Price, December 28, 1848, and was the father of nine children, four of whom survive him.
 He moved from Indiana to Iowa and from there to California. In 1883 he settled in southern Oregon and in 1897 came to Polk county where he resided until the time of his death. He joined the Christian church in Iowa in his early manhood and lived an upright, consistent life.
