The way to build up Dallas is to patronize Dallas people.



Lovers of fair sport will commend the course of the Dallas College basketball boys in refusing to play their team in its present crippled condition against the comparatively fresh team of the Oregon Agricultural College. Weakened and tired from a long winter's playing, and with one of its best men out of the game, it would be unjust to ask the Dallas team to play against a team that refused to join the state league and rested while the other players were battling for state honors in order that it might meet the tired winners with a fresh team and perchance win an easy victory. The opinion seems to prevail in basketball circles that if Corvallis desires these honors, it should be willing to fight for them. The sporting editor of the Portland Telegram expresses the general sentiment when he says: "For the sake of harmony and promoting the game, O. A. C. ought not to hang out of the league for petty quarrels. It is suggested that it join the league and some amicable arrangement be made by which the winning team each year should have the privilege of an extended tour the next season and a later series with the winner of those who stay at home for the championship. As it is impossible for a schedule to be arranged between all the teams of the state, some such arrangement is necessary to make the league truly representative."

No good and useful purpose is served at this time by quarreling over who was responsible for the defeat of the Monmouth and Drain Normal School appropriations. One thing is certain, the Ashland and Weston schools were handsomely provided for, and the Monmouth and Drain institutions were left out in the cold. This result was all brought about by the scheming of a lot of cheap politicians at Salem, without particular regard to the wishes of the people or interest in the educational needs of the state. The proper way to settle the Normal school question is to put the four schools squarely upon their merits before the people and let the voters decide which shall be retained and which abolished. This course will take the Normal schools out of politics and settle the question for all time to come.

LIVELY TAX PAYING

Money Flows In So Rapidly That Sheriff Has No Time to Count It.

Money has been pouring into the county treasury in a golden stream this week. Sheriff Grant and Deputies Richter and Staats are kept busy issuing receipts to the taxpayers who are desirous of saving the three per cent rebate, and it is believed that there will be few property-owners who have not paid in full or in part when the time for allowing the rebate ends at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The officers have been so busy taking in the money that they have had no time to foot up the total collections in dollars and cents, but Sheriff Grant says that, as nearly as he can estimate, he has about eight bushels of cash and checks on hand, with good prospects of taking in about two bushels more today. This is about as close as he will be able to come to it until he gets a chance to add up the payments.

Taxes will become delinquent on Monday, April 1, but all who pay one-half of their taxes before that date will be given until the first Monday in October to pay the remaining one-half.

FEAR FOR THEIR LIVES

Mrs. F. A. Wolfe Believes Attempt Was Made to Poison Members of Her Household.

That some person has designs upon her life and the lives of her family is the belief of Mrs. F. A. Wolfe, of Falls City, who appeared at the office of Deputy District Attorney Sibley yesterday and reported that an attempt had been made to poison the members of her household.

According to her story, she returned home from church Sunday evening and, as was her usual custom, took a drink of water before retiring for the night. Noticing that the water had a peculiar, bitter taste, she requested her adopted daughter to taste it. The young woman drank a small portion of the contents of the glass and also experienced the bitter taste. The two ladies became thoroughly alarmed, and their fear was greatly increased when, later in the evening, both became slightly ill. No serious results followed, however, and yesterday morning Mrs. Wolfe came to Dallas and told Attorney Sibley of her experience. She also brought a sample of the water for analysis. The officer promised to investigate the matter and the lady returned to her home.

Late yesterday afternoon Judge Sibley summoned the courage to taste the water—a very gingerly taste, it may be added—and after alternately sipping and spitting for several minutes, and giving the suspected poison a chance to do its worst, he confidentially informed the Osseaux man that it tasted to him like plain, old-fashioned Epsom salts. He was not strong enough in his conclusions, however, to test it farther, and he may decide later to submit the contents of the jar to a chemist for expert analysis. Meanwhile, the Judge will keep the water in his office, where anyone wanting a drink of it may have it for the asking.

GRAND OFFICER COMING
