The Horse Show at Woodburn last Saturday was a highly successful affair, notwithstanding the inclement weather. The horse breeders of Polk county will hold a show in Dallas next Saturday afternoon and it is hoped that an equally good showing will be made. Polk county boasts of some of the finest horses in the world and the success or failure of Saturday's parade will depend upon the interest taken in the exhibit by the owners of these blooded animals.

The Oregon State Grange has decided to invoke the referendum on two acts passed by the recent Legislature. One of these is the compulsory pass law and the other the bill appropriating \$100,000 for armories for the state militia. An initiative measure will be prepared later to include the Normal School question. It is said that the \$125,000 appropriation for the University of Oregon is also to receive attention. There will be something doing every minute when the Grangers once get started.

A few years ago the book-typewriter was a convenience unknown to the county clerks and recorders of Oregon. According to the Corvallis Republican, there are only two counties in the state without these machines at the present time. The first book-typewriter was installed in the Polk county clerk's office about five years ago and proved such a saver of time and money that a second machine was soon added. Judge Coad informs the OREGONIAN that these two typewriters save the county fully \$600 a year in the expense of deputy hire and blank record books. Pretty good yearly interest on an investment of less than \$500.

The legislature has submitted to a vote of the people three proposed constitutional amendments which will be voted upon at the June election in 1908. One of these proposes to change the time of the general election from June to November, so as to correspond with the time of the National election. Another is designed to increase the number of supreme judges from three to five and give the legislature power to vest circuit courts with probate jurisdiction. The third increases the compensation of members of the legislature from \$3 a day to \$400 for the session, or \$10 a day. Without looking into the details of these amendments, it would appear safe to urge the voters to kill all three of them. The titles alone are sufficient to warrant their condemnation.

MRS. ORLENA M. STAATS Dies at Her Home Near Airlie, Aged 79 Years.

Mrs. Orlena M. Staats, a pioneer of Polk county, died Monday morning after an illness of several months consequent upon old age. "Grandma" Staats, as she was familiarly called, was born in Granger County, Tenn., March 4, 1828. She crossed the plains with her parents in 1845 at the age of 16 years. On May 10, 1846, she was married to the late Isaac Staats, who crossed the plains in the same company. They took up a donation land claim of 640 acres in what is now known as the Luckiamute Valley, in this county, on which she resided up to the time of her death, her husband preceding her in death in August 1882. The deceased was the mother of six sons and one daughter, all of whom survive her but one son. They are J. M., H. D., J. O., C. E. and A. C. Staats, all of Airlie, and Mrs. M. I. Dalton, of Monmouth. J. J. Williams, of this city, and W. E. and T. B. Williams, of Airlie, being her brothers. The funeral will take place at her residence tomorrow. Interment will be at the old English cemetery at Airlie.

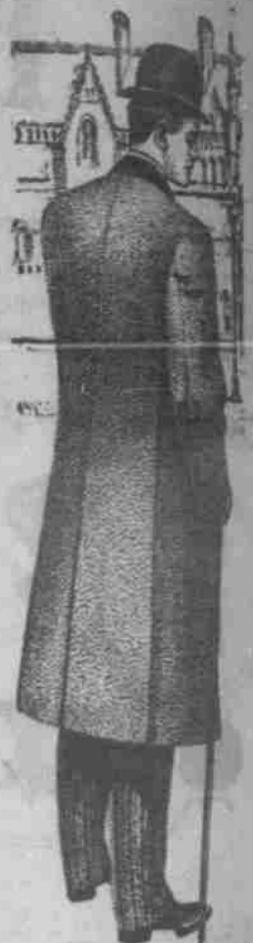
