MUIR WINS THE RACE

Veteran Councilman Honored With Office of Mayor by Voters of Dallas.

Mayor—A. B. Muir.
Councilman-at-large—H. B. Cosper, (re-elected).

Auditor—Lott D. Brown.
Councilmen—First ward, Conrad Stafrin, (re-elected); second ward, C. E. Shaw; third ward, F. J. Coad, (re-elected).

A. B. Muir, the veteran councilman from the Third Ward, was elected Mayor of Dallas yesterday, defeating Edward Biddle, the incumbent, by five votes. Mr. Muir carried the Second Ward by two votes, the Third Ward by 21 votes, and lost the First Ward by 18 votes. The contest was good-natured, but earnest, and heroic work was done by the supporters of each candidate. Two years ago, Mr. Biddle defeated Mr. Muir for Mayor by a majority of 69 votes.

Lively interest was taken in the election and a heavy vote was cast, especially in the Second and Third Wards. H. B. Cosper was re-elected councilman-at-large without opposition, as was Conrad Stafrin for Councilman from the First Ward.

Up in Second Ward, where there were three candidates for councilman in the field, the battle waged warmest, with the result that the heaviest vote ever cast in the ward was polled. C. E. Shaw, the last candidate to file his petition, was an easy winner, Councilman W. A. Ayres and J. M. Lynn, his opponents, running neck and neck for second place. F. J. Coad was re-elected Councilman in the third ward, defeating S. M. Ray by 21 votes.

One of the surprises of the election was the defeat of Auditor Dan P. Stouffer, who lost to Lott Brown by the narrow margin of three votes. Mr. Brown carried the Second Ward by two votes and his home ward by a heavy majority, while Mr. Stouffer was an easy winner in the First Ward.

The official count will be made late this afternoon or tomorrow morning. While it is possible that this count may change the result as announced above, it is hardly probable that any mistakes will be found in the returns. The newly elected officers will take their seats on Monday, May 6.

Polk County Mohair Growers Will Sell Pool Saturday, April 20.

The Polk County mohair pool will be sold Saturday, April 20, at 1:30 p. m. This date was decided upon at a largely attended meeting of the growers in Dallas Saturday afternoon. The growers will meet at 10:30 a. m. on the day of the sale to adopt method of disposing of the pool.

The plan of grading the hair finds much favor among the Polk County goatmen this year, and a large majority of them will sort their clip into three grades, although the rule is not compulsory. The growers believe that by grading the hair they will receive a higher average price than they have realized heretofore. The pool will contain from 50,000 to 60,000 pounds of mohair.
