City Council Meeting.
The city council met last night and awarded the contract for grading Court street, east of Jefferson street, to F. S. Ramsey. The contract price is \$55.
The street committee reported that it had changed the grade and located the laterals of the Oak Street sewer.
A petition for a street light in the Ellis addition was laid on the table.
A new sidewalk was ordered built on both sides of the Christian Church property.
The ordinance providing that all sidewalks hereafter built in the business district shall be constructed of concrete was passed by a unanimous vote.
The Auditor was instructed to notify the Willamette Valley Company that all street lights must be raised to a height of 30 feet, and must give out 1200 candle-power each.
