## BOYS' MEETING IN SALEM

Will Be First Gathering of Kind Ever Held in State of Oregon.

Mrs. F. H. Morrison requests the Observer to call attention to the Boys' Conference, which is to be held in Salem on Saturday and Sunday, May 25 and 26, when representatives from boys' organizations in Portland and the Willamette Valley towns will be present and discuss boys' needs and the best methods of work in supplying those needs.

The Salem Statesman says that credit for this conference, the first of its kind to be held in Oregon, is due to the Capital City Y. M. C. A. The people of Salem are making arrangements for the entertainment of the fifty or more boys who are expected to attend as delegates from outside towns. The delegates will be boys from 14 to 17 years of age, each group being accompanied by its leader. The program will be one of unusual interest.

B. C. Wood Buys Lease and Furniture From J. W. Corser.

The Dallas Hotel changed hands Saturday, B. C. Wood buying the lease and furniture from J. W. Corser. The new landlord took charge of the property yesterday morning.

Wants Oregon Lumber.

Oregon lumbermen are offered an opportunity to supply the Government with 8,000,000 feet of No. 1 merchantable Douglas fir for construction work at the Panama Canal. Blank proposals calling for bids on that amount of lumber have been received by Secretary Edmond C. Giltner, of the Chamber of Commerce, of whom dealers desiring to make a bid may secure them. The specifications call for common long-leaf yellow pine, common redwood or Douglas fir. The latter tree is plentiful in this state and a number of millmen have applied for blanks on which to submit bids. It offers them an opportunity to dispose of a part of their surplus stock which has accumulated from an inability to secure cars with which to fill other consignments. This lumber will be shipped direct from Portland by steamer.—Oregonian.

## BUSY COURT SESSION

Grand Jury is Called—Attendance Larger Than Usual.

Judge Burnett convened his department of Circuit Court in Dallas yesterday morning. Several cases of importance are up for trial this term and the attendance of lawyers, litigants and witnesses is larger than usual. Several jury cases are to be tried, and it is probable that the session will last well toward the end of the week.

A grand jury was asked for by Deputy District Attorney McNary and the following citizens were drawn to serve: John T. Ford, forman; W. R. Howe, J. D. Moyer, L. Bitner, J. M. Prather, Dave Stapleton and A. R. Southwick. A report was handed in this morning, but as its contents were not made public, it is not known at this hour whether any true bills have been found. The grand jury bailiff is Justice Hardy Holman. H. B. Cooper is bailiff of the Court.
