COMMENCEMENT WEEK

Dallas College Closes the School Year With Graduating Exercises and Interesting Programs.

The commencement exercises of Dallas College thus far have been the most successful and interesting in the history of the institution. Larger crowds were in attendance and more interest has been manifested by the citizens of Dallas than ever before.

The first number of the commencement series was a lecture delivered at the Evangelical church Thursday evening, May 30, by Dr. Kimball, Dean of the Kimball School of Theology. The subject of his address was "Christ Revealed in the Ethical Religions." This was one of the most scholarly and interesting addresses ever delivered from a Dallas platform.

On Friday night at the College Chapel the Philadelphia Literary Society gave its fourth annual program to a large and delighted audience. The program, with the exception of the musical numbers, was entirely original. The productions delivered showed careful preparation and there was not a weak number on the program. Immediately after the program the members of the society with their invited guests repaired to the Dallas Hotel, where an excellent banquet was partaken of. A happy social hour was spent around the table.

Saturday evening, the Utopian Society entertained the public with a highly interesting and amusing entertainment. From all sides are heard words of praise for the excellent manner in which the young ladies delivered their program. The most unique feature of the evening was "Famous Women," in which some of the world's greatest women were represented by fourteen young ladies. The crown of success was given to the "Oregon Pioneer Mother."

On Sunday morning Dr. C. A. Mook delivered the baccalaureate sermon. The subject of the address was "There is Nothing Hid but Shall be Revealed." The speaker asserted his belief in the superiority of mind over matter. He said that thus far the human race had only found the things which lie on the surface, but the deeper and more intricate things were yet to be fathomed.

Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the farewell meeting of the Christian Associations was held at the college chapel. This meeting was ably conducted by Professor Metzger. The sermon before the Associations was delivered in the evening by Dr. I. D. Driver, of Portland, on the subject "Opportunity."

Monday evening, Governor George E. Chamberlain delivered an address before the Literary Societies on the subject "Duties of Citizenship." He showed that Oregon was leading the United States and entire world in municipal reform. She is one of the few states of the Union in which her people have complete power.

This evening at 8 o'clock the musical recital under the able management of Prof. William Caldwell will be given at the church. Tomorrow morning, at 10 o'clock the commencement exercises will be held. At 2:30 p. m., the class day exercises on the college campus and at 8 p. m., the Alumni reunion and banquet will be given.

Accident at Rickreall.

T. R. Crook, a laborer on the Caulfield farm near Rickreall, met with an accident while working in the field last Thursday, that may result fatally. He was driving a four-horse team to a clod masher when in some manner he fell from his seat and was thrown in front of the heavy roller. Being unable to extricate himself from his perilous position, he was dragged a distance of 150 yards and was horribly bruised and mangled. One arm was badly lacerated, several blood vessels were ruptured and severe internal injuries were sustained. The unfortunate man pluckily held to the lines and finally succeeded in stopping the team. Neighbors rushed to his assistance and rescued him after considerable difficulty. He was carried to the house and Dr. Starbuck, of Dallas, was summoned to attend to his injuries. At last reports, he was in a precarious condition, and fears are entertained that he will not recover.
