BUYS NEW MACHINERY

Capacity of Willamette Valley Lumber Company Sawmill to be increased.

New machinery now being installed and that to be added later will increase the capacity of the Willamette Valley Lumber Company's sawmill in this city fully 15 per cent. The mill is cutting 70,000 feet a day at the present time. With the new machinery in operation, the daily output of lumber will be increased to 80,000 feet.

Manager George T. Gerlinger informs the OBSERVER that new steam boilers are being placed on all of the boilers and that a twin engine steam feed will be installed this month. A new main conveyor has been completed between the mill and the refuse burner. Another 10 by 12 donkey engine from the Washington Iron Works was sent out to the logging camp a few days ago.

The Willamette Valley mill is one of the best of its class in Oregon, and it is being constantly improved and enlarged. An excellent body of timber is being logged in the mountains west of Falls City and a fine grade of lumber manufactured. The mill is kept running on full time, with a plentiful supply of logs in the pond.
