To build a house ten miles from the place it is to be lived in is, somewhat unusual, but that is what the Willamette Valley Lumber Company has been doing. Bunk houses, capable of accommodating eight men, are built in their lumber yard in Dallas, after which they are loaded on flat cars and shipped to the logging camps at the terminus of the Dallas and Falls City railroad. The bunk houses are built on skid runners, so that they can be moved readily whenever it is necessary to change the camp.
