BRILLIANT ILLUMINATION

Dallas Will Be Ablaze With Electric Lights on Nights of July 3 and 4.

Visitors in Dallas on the nights of July 3 and 4 will see a brilliantly illuminated city. The committee on decorations has closed a contract with the Willamette Valley Company for a row of incandescent lights on Main street from Court to Oak; on Mill street from the center of the Courthouse square to the center of the next block west, and on Court street from the center of the Courthouse square to the west end of the Wilson building. The lights will be strung in the center of the street, and it is expected that the illumination will add greatly to the holiday appearance of the town.

The big attraction on the Fourth will be the ball game between the McMinnville and Forest Grove teams. These are the two crack teams of the Willamette Valley, and a great exhibition of the National game is assured. Forest Grove defeated McMinnville early in the season, and on Sunday last was defeated in turn by the sturdy Yamhill team. The two teams have agreed to play the deciding game on the Dallas diamond, and the fans are looking forward to one of the hottest contests ever seen on a baseball field in Oregon.

The people of McMinnville and Forest Grove are intensely loyal to their respective teams and will send hundreds of rooters to Dallas to whom it is up strong on the Fourth. The McMinnville visitors will come on a special train, and the people of the Grove are now making arrangements to run an excursion from that city. Manager John Wirtz telephoned a request for a supply of the large posters yesterday and has promised to see that the celebration is thoroughly advertised in his town. The Chemawa Indian team will play the Dallas boys on July 3, and either with Dallas or one of the other visiting teams on the Fourth.

R. E. Williams, manager of the Baby Show, requests us to announce that the exhibition of pretty babies will be held in the City Park at 11:30 o'clock on the morning of the Fourth. A large tent has been secured for the show. Requests for information concerning this attraction are coming in by mail and telephone from all parts of the county, indicating that a lively interest is being taken in this feature of the celebration. The contest will be open to all babies between the ages of six months and two years. The prizes are being selected by Mrs. F. H. Morrison and will be well worth competing for. First and second prizes will be awarded for the prettiest baby between the ages of six months and one year; also, first and second prizes for the prettiest baby between the ages of one year and two years.

Active preparations are being made for the Pioneer Reunion on July 3, and a program of unusual interest will be provided. The annual address will be delivered by Hon. Tilmon Ford, of Salem. Three brass bands and the singers of Dallas will furnish plenty of good music. The annual business meeting and election of officers will be held in the afternoon. The pioneers will be treated to an unusual surprise this year in the shape of a fine banquet at noon. Dinner will be served in the old skating rink building on Oak street, where tables laden with all the good things the market affords will be the center of interest and attraction for the honored guests at the noon hour. The banquet will be for pioneers only, and none else will be admitted.

Interest in the morning parade on the Fourth is growing every day, and the business firms that hesitated to take part at first are now falling into line and preparing floats. Every business man in Dallas should constitute himself a committee of one to help this feature of the celebration. If each firm will only do its share, the parade will be the biggest thing ever seen in Polk county and will give the visitors something to remember with pleasure for the rest of their lives.

T. J. Graves, of McCoy, was in Dallas, Wednesday, attending to business matters and shaking hands with his many friends. This was his first trip to Dallas for over a year, his farm and 35-acre hop yard having kept him at home every day. His hop yard is in excellent condition, and he expects a good yield this year. Mr. Graves has been invited to act as one of the Marshals at the big celebration in Dallas, and has promised to come if he can possibly get away from home on that day.
