USE POLK COUNTY CLAY

Newberg Factory Furnishes Brick For New College Buildings in Corvallis.

One of the finest clay beds in the United States is located on the banks of the Willamette river at Buena Vista, in Polk county. For many years a pottery was operated at that place, but more recently the clay has been hauled to Newberg where it is made up into pressed bricks. The fact that some of the brick made from this Buena Vista clay are to be used in the new building for the Woman's college at the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis leads the Corvallis Times to say:

"Pressed brick is arriving for completion of the walls of the Woman's building at the college. It comes from Newberg, and thereby hangs a tale. The clay for making it is taken from the banks of the Willamette near Buena Vista. The clay bed could not be reached on account of high water during the boating season, and the material, after being dug from the bank, was hauled by team to the railroad at Parker station. The men who hauled it made \$5.50 per day, which is a straw that shows something of the cost of the brick."

"By train, the clay was carried to the brick works at Newberg, and then, by train it was carried to Corvallis. For all this handling there was a good wage, and the ultimate cost of the brick may be imagined. There are 400,000 brick, pressed and common, in the building."
