NORMAL REGENTS CHOSEN.

The new Board of Regents for all the state normal schools was named by Governor Chamberlain, Wednesday. Five of the Regents are Democrats and four are Republicans. None of these men lives in a normal school town or has any connection with a normal school.

C. E. Spence, of Clackamas county, is a farmer and a Democrat.

E. Hofer, of Marion county, is an editor and a Republican.

E. E. Bragg, of Union county, is County School Superintendent and a Democrat.

W. B. Ayer, of Multnomah county, is a lumber manufacturer and a Republican.

H. J. Maier, of Wasco county, is a merchant and a Democrat.

Stephen Jewell, of Josephine county, is County Judge and a Democrat.

The State Board of Education, composed of the Governor, Secretary of State and Superintendent of Public Instruction, are ex-officio members of the Board. The Regents receive no salary or fee for their services with the exception of traveling expenses to and from the board meetings.

The Salem Statesman has the following good words for Oregon's Parent Normal: "It is a significant fact and one which redounds to the glory of 'Old Monmouth,' that nine of her alumni are now county school superintendents in Oregon and that two of her alumni are presidents of Oregon normal schools, namely, B. F. Mulkey of Ashland and A. L. Briggs of Drain."

The growing popularity of Dallas College among the young men and young women of Western Oregon is plainly evidenced by the fact that three of the contestants in the Journal contest are striving for the scholarship in that institution. The demand for instruction in the Dallas school is illustrated most forcibly in the efforts being made for the scholarship by Earl Heckart, of Corvallis, when at his very home, is the free state institution, the Oregon Agricultural college.

The editor of an exchange remarks in a recent issue that no man is a good citizen until he takes an active interest in the welfare of the town; no man is a good citizen who regards the town merely as a convenient place in which to live. No man is a good citizen until he becomes jealous about the town and all her material and moral affairs. Every citizen ought to stop and ask himself every once in a while: "What can I do to make the town a better and more homelike place?"

The referendum petitions have been knocked sky-high. Judge Galloway holds that the failure to print the warning against illegal signatures is fatal to the free press referendum, and that the failure to copy the full and correct title of the University appropriation bill is fatal to that petition. And thus the Populistic farce goes on. The people did not understand the "initiative and referendum" when they voted on it; they do not understand it now, nor is it probable that they ever will. The changing of the state constitution to suit the ideas of a few visionary cranks and Populistic dreamers was a sorry piece of foolishness, and one for which the people will yet pay dearly. In adopting this revolutionary amendment, the voters thought they were giving themselves more power; but now they find that the "initiative and referendum" is a bunglesome, impracticable measure, without a single redeeming feature in its favor. Not one beneficial result has it accomplished thus far, nor is it likely that anything will come of it in future save worry and expense. The U'Ben-Brownell outfit certainly handed the young and progressive State of Oregon a life-sized gold brick.
