SKIM MILK FOR LAYERS.

Tests Which Indicate That It Greatly Increases Egg Production.

The department of agriculture has received a report from the West Virginia experiment station of a test feed mash, says American Poultry Journal.

In the first test, which covered 122 days, twenty-two hens fed skim milk laid 1,244 eggs as compared with 996 eggs laid by the twenty-two hens fed mash wet with water.

In the first period of the second test compared with 632 eggs laid by a simllar lot fed no skim milk. In the second period the rations were reversed. The chickens fed skim milk laid 1,220 eggs in fifty-six days as compared with 978 in the case of the lot fed no skim milk. In both experiments more eggs were produced when skim milk was




