LARGE MACHINE SHOPS

Dallas & Falls City Railroad Has Most Extensive Plant Outside of Portland.

The largest and most completely equipped machine shop in Oregon, outside of Portland, is located in Dallas. The plant is the new machine and repair shops of the Dallas & Falls City Railroad Company, on the company's terminal grounds in South Dallas. The buildings are all nearing completion, and a force of machinists under the direction of Master Mechanic Carl Gerlinger are installing the heavy and expensive machinery.

The main buildings are three in number. The largest structure of the group is the general machine shop. This building is 70 by 75 feet in size, two stories in height, and well lighted by windows and skylights. The car repair shop is next in size, and is also a strong and well-lighted building. The roundhouse is built on modern plans, and has stalls for three locomotives.

Among the features of interest in the main shop will be noted: A drop pit, constructed entirely of concrete, by the use of which the wheels of a locomotive may be removed without raising the machinery. If it is desired to raise the locomotive for any purpose, the work is easily accomplished by a hydraulic lift. Other modern machinery in the shop consists of a 30x30 metal planer, a monster machine costing \$2500; a 36-inch lathe, and a smaller lathe for brass work; a wheel press of the very latest pattern; a 4-foot radial drill, so constructed as to drill in any direction or at any angle; a bolt cutter, which will manufacture bolts of any size at a high rate of speed; a metal saw; a 150-pound hammer, and a portable crane. Power is furnished by a 20-horse-power electric motor, driven by the current from the Willamette Valley Company's dynamo.

The car repair shop is 30 by 140 feet in size and contains all of the wood-working tools needed in building or repairing cars. The blacksmith shop is directly connected with the machine shop and is also modern in its equipment.

These shops would be creditable to any of the larger railroads of the country, and their building and equipment is in line with the substantial and permanent character of all construction work heretofore done by the Dallas and Falls City company. The shop will give steady employment to a large number of men, and will add a neat sum each month to Dallas' already large payroll.
