Hop Crop Promises Fine.

General reports are to the effect that there will be a very fine hop crop harvested in western Oregon. There is plenty of labor to pick the crop, on the theory that 150,000 bales were picked last year and there was talk of a shortage of labor then. There will be as many hops this year in Oregon if the crop is harvested. One thing that will cut the crop down is the difficulty renters are having in borrowing picking money, as banks have shut down on all such cases, except the land owner will join in the notes and give an option to sell the crop as soon as it is in the bale. Unless land owners come to the relief of the renters, many rented hop yards will go without picking.—Salem Journal.
