SPRAYING BENEFITS APPLES

Better Fruit is Grown in the Wil-
lamette Valley on Account of
Careful Attention.

The grocerymen and consumers of
apples in Salem are expressing their
satisfaction on the state of the fruit
industry in the Willamette valley.

The condition of the Gravensteins
which are now coming into town in
large quantities may safely be taken
as an indication of the quality of the
entire crop, and these certainly indicate
a decided improvement in the care of
trees and packing the crop on the
part of the fruit growers. Indeed, one
local grocery man expressed the
opinion that the fruit was in better
condition by 200 per cent than ever
before, and nearly all agree that the
improvement is marked in all
fruit.

The chief cause of this is better
spraying. This has been seriously
neglected in the Willamette valley
and although it is the best fruit raising
country in the state, the apples of
Hood River and Rogue River valley
have outstripped them in reputation.

This, in the opinion of C. W. Arm-
strong, state fruit inspector, is entirely
due to the superior care exercised by
the farmers of those localities, and
that facilities in the Willamette were
equal, if not better in every way.

However the farmers in this locality
have just recently woke up in this
respect, and have sprayed this spring
as never before. Instead of the care-
less and indiscriminate spraying
which they have practiced heretofore,
they are going at it in a scientific
manner and results of this are already
apparent. The obsolete "Paris green"
has been abolished in nearly all
localities and the farmers are using
soluble arsenates of lead. Many
farmers are spraying their late crops
of apples this week.

Mr. Armstrong has lately returned
from Seattle and Tacoma, where he
went to investigate alleged discrimi-
nation against Oregon peaches by
falsely claiming that Oregon fruit was
infected with San Jose scale. He
found that the discrimination did
really exist, and that what was called
San Jose scale was a harmless fungus.

He kept several of the peaches for
use as evidence. He said that in his
opinion the peaches raised in Missou-
la bottom compared favorably with any
on the coast.

The Oregon State Fair has estab-
lished a fruit department and there is
little doubt that the Willamette valley
will be well represented. Fruit growers
of Hood and Rogue Rivers and of dif-
ferent places in the south of the state
have promised exhibits, so that there
will be plenty of competition. This is
to be in charge of Fruit Inspector
Armstrong, as Mr. L. T. Reynolds
found it impossible to attend to it.

Only perfect fruit will be accepted in
this department and no prizes will be
awarded to any but excellent fruit
whether or not there is any competition.
—Salem Journal.
