It would seem that the S. P. would make a decided gain by making a cut-off a short distance south of Amity. It would save keeping up a number of miles of extra track, and give the same advantages that were gained by the cut-off from Lafayette to St. Joe two or three years ago. That move saved the company some half dozen miles of track and an expensive bridge. The one mentioned would at least save something like an equal amount of trackage. Should it result unfavorably, it ought to put an everlasting end to some of the senseless kicking that has been made against Mr. Gates ever since he took charge of the plant and which has doubtless hastened his desire to sell the property.
