CIRCULATION GROWS.

Doubtless the ruthless exterminators will entertain feelings of heartiest gratitude toward these zealous but near-sighted men who have so kindly furnished them with all the information necessary to direct them to the haunts of these elusive animals, of whose exact whereabouts many of them were probably ignorant before.

HENEY OUT AGAINST FULTON

Noted Prosecutor Threatens to Take
Stump to Oppose Him.

If Charles W. Fulton goes before the people as a candidate for re-election to the United States Senate as he has said he will, Francis J. Heney declares he will come to Oregon and take the stump against him.

While on his recent visit to Portland, the fiery Californian confided to several friends his intention of taking a hand in Oregon politics, in the event the man who he asserts has opposed him and his policies in this state should again ask the people of Oregon for political preferment.

Rumors that Mr. Heney entertained such designs have been in circulation for some time. Even before the last coming of the famous prosecutor, stories to that effect were rife, and they received confirmation at the hands of Mr. Heney himself while here.

Senator Fulton's relations, political and otherwise, with the leading lights of the old ring, which long reigned supreme in the politics of the state and ultimately became involved in the land-fraud expose and several other things, of which it is understood the prosecutor has more or less knowledge, are said to be the things in the abstract which Mr. Heney will talk about from the stump, in case he should feel called upon to go into the fight.

The fact that Mr. Heney has threatened to turn the shafts of his oratory on Senator Fulton as a candidate has served to heighten the hopes of other aspirants for United States Senator, but in the light of all this it is not understood that Heney's antagonism to Fulton is of a political nature. While he was the right-hand man of the President and the arbiter of things in Oregon, Mr. Heney kept out of the

political embroilment and sawed wood. He spared neither Republican nor Democrat, but prosecuted both with equal vigor.

The primary campaign will open next Spring, but just when Mr. Heney will come or exactly what his tactics will be are yet in the dark. All that is known is that Mr. Heney has said that if Fulton is a candidate to succeed himself he will take the field and oppose him and the working out of this threat remains for the development of events between now and next June.

If Heney takes the stump it is believed Fulton will fight back. His regard for the noted Californian is no less vehement than that of Heney for him and, moreover, his political fortunes will be at stake. Heney's methods of public address are familiar to the people of Oregon and if the expected comes to pass, the next electoral battle in this state promises to be the most spectacular in its history. —Evening Telegram.
