Greater Oregon's State Fair deserves a still better name—Oregon's Greatest State Fair.

Up in Sherman county, there is another Observer that has no use for the Populist initiative and referendum.

Oregon apples at \$8 a box! Sounds like the good old days of the mining excitement in California, when Oregon fruit was worth almost its weight in gold.

Willamette Valley lumber manufacturers will be interested in the fact that the published advance of 5 cents a hundred pounds on lumber from Valley mills to Salt Lake and common points will not be put into effect by the railroads. The rate was inserted in the new lumber tariff on Eastern shipments by mistake and will be corrected.

The State of Oregon lost nothing by the failure of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank. A draft for \$34,000.25, covering the full amount of the state's deposit in the defunct bank, was turned over to State Treasurer Steel by the American Surety Company, Saturday. Having made good its bond, the surety company becomes one of the principal creditors of the bank.

Much greater interest in the Industrial Fair is being exhibited by the people throughout Polk County than the executive committee had at first anticipated. Superintendent Seymour says that he has been receiving dozens of communications daily, by mail or phone, from the school children or their parents, asking for room in which to display their exhibits.

Nothing doing in the hop market in the Dallas district this week. Offers of 8 and 8 1/2 cents are freely made, but find no takers. Nine cents has been offered for a few choice crops. The market has a decidedly healthier tone, and the farmers believe they will realize 10 cents or better. The recent purchase of a carload lot at Salem by Hubbard & Hart, at 9 cents, has encouraged the growers to hold for a better figure.

Is it complimentary to President Roosevelt for yellow journals and demagogic politicians to insist, or even intimate, that the President would accept a nomination after having so positively, and voluntarily, stated that he would not be a candidate again? The American people believe in Theodore Roosevelt. It would be hard to convince them that he is a liar. He is too great a man to become one, just to please a lot of sycophantic demagogues.

Pool-selling was prohibited at the State Fair races, and the best horses won. The prizes were generous, being large enough to bring the owners of the fastest animals on the coast in to the competition. The attendance of spectators was the largest in the history of the fair, and the races were greatly enjoyed by all. The Northwest racing record, broken by Sir John S., the crack Los Angeles pacer in 2:07 1/2, was again broken on Saturday, when Sherlock Holmes won his mile in 2:06 1/2. It is just such good clean racing as this, that will restore the "sport of kings" to its old-time popularity in Oregon, and elsewhere.

While the attendance at the Jamestown Exposition is gradually increasing, it is now certain that the Government will get back only a small part of its million dollar loan. Whatever else may be said of it, the "Jamestown" fair is a fizzle, financially. In strong contrast stands out the management of the Lewis and Clark Fair, which paid its stockholders a handsome dividend on their investment. Speaking of the Portland show, the Seattle Westerner says: "With a success that set the whole world by the ears, the people of Portland, in the year 1905, held the Lewis and Clark exposition, and taught the rest of the universe its first lesson in how to make a world's fair pay dividends."
