BUSH CRITICIZES GOVERNOR.

The interview of Hon. A. Bush, the pioneer Salem banker, on the present financial situation, is the most lucid of any utterance yet published, says the Eugene Guard. To those who know the man, it will carry conviction and they will heed his advice. Mr. Bush is a banker of the old school, honest conservative and clear-headed, who never allows his vaults to be depleted nor indulges in speculative investments, and when he tells the public to go ahead with its business and let this little flurry have no more than a passing notice, he knows whereof he speaks.

In brief, Mr. Bush says the Portland bankers induced the governor to do an unwise thing in proclaiming the special holidays, and that Oregon is prosperous and solid, requiring a large volume of money for her enormous crop movement, the shortage of cash in some of the banks being for this reason, a sign rather of prosperity than the reverse.

The Dallas Observer says: "It is doubtful if one voter in a dozen took time to read the Initiative and Referendum amendment before voting for it, and it is doubtful if any considerable number of them have read it since." Is that an objection? It is doubtful if any considerable number of voters have read the constitution of Oregon, or the constitution of the United States, but is that a reason for abandoning either? Not one person in a thousand has read the Bible through; but is that a sufficient reason to destroy it, and to kick the whole system of Christianity overboard?—Portland Journal.

No. But the more one reads the Bible, the more good one finds in it. The more one reads the Constitution of the United States, the greater becomes one's respect for the wisdom of the framers of that immortal document. Not so with the Initiative and Referendum. The more the people of Oregon study that amendment, and observe its practical workings, the more they realize that George Brownell and Bill U'ten handed them a life-sized gold brick.

City Rock Crusher and Steam Roller Brought Up From Portland Last Night.

After having been on the road for nearly two months, the rock crusher purchased by the Dallas city council arrived from Fort Wayne, Indiana, on last night's freight train. With it came the big steam road roller, also purchased by the city. The ponderous machinery was unloaded near the public school building this morning, where it was inspected by a large number of people. The crusher will be taken at once to the city quarry on the Boise farm, where it will be placed in readiness for operation. The roller will be put to work on the new grade on Court street.

Frank Shannon, the expert machinist sent from Portland to superintend the installing of the crusher, says that since the rock bins are all completed, he sees no reason why the machine cannot be set up ready for work inside of four days.
